

### Your Stars Tonight.

The steamed dietor settles into her deckchair on St Ives beach and pointedly remarks that she is privileged to have Parish Newsletter contributors who provide their copy on time even when she is on holiday. "And while I am on the subject of the newsletter" she remarks somewhat tartly "I am not aware of any astronomical value from the scantily clad young ladies you are observing through the binoculars". I begin to make a feeble joke about planetary orbs but the steely glint brings me up short. As the sunshine of the surprise 'Indian Summer' warms my old bones I fall back into a peaceful reverie on another little known wonder of the night skies - double stars.

On the next clear night look at the Plough and focus the binoculars on the middle star of the Plough's "handle". With even low power binoculars this star (named Mizar) is resolved as a double star - and with a little patience on a clear night the brightest star becomes a second double. Double stars came in a huge variety of sizes and colours ranging from identical twins (which are fairly rare) to multiple stars of hugely different size colour and brightness. A superb example (it needs a little effort to find it but it's well worth dusting off the star map) is in the constellation of Cygnus (the Swan) which is currently visible before midnight in the South West. Cygnus looks like a slightly misshapen cross with the extended swan neck and head pointing to the Western horizon. The star that makes up the head is Albireo and with binoculars it separates out into a topaz orange star and a smaller star with definite sapphire tint.

If you managed to find Cygnus, try a more tricky target - the insignificant constellation of Delphinus (the Dolphin) which has a couple of double star delights. From Cygnus look a little to the left towards the still bright orange planet Jupiter. Delphinus is made up of 5 faint stars and covers the area about the size of two full moons. Through binoculars both the top left hand and bottom right hand stars are in fact close doubles - well worth a look. For more information a quick search on the internet will provide several listings such as "the top 100 double stars".

Astronomers have now discovered that that most stars are in fact multiple stars which revolve around each other in a complex dance of gravitational attraction. Our own sun is an exception - but if its biggest planet, Jupiter

had grown about 10 times larger it would have been massive enough to ignite its own nuclear reactions and so become a mini star circling our sun shining with it own light rather than the sun's reflected light as it does now. Living on a planet with two suns could be challenging when looking for a shady place on the beach!

### History Corner Alan Yates

Tales of Harvests past.

UGBOROUGH. - On the 18<sup>th</sup> of September, this picturesque village was the scene of much festivity and gaiety, Lady Carew having given her annual treat to the labouring inhabitants of the parish - her practice at the close of harvest. About 80 men were provided with a substantial dinner of roast beef and plum pudding, with a plentiful allowance of good beer to warm their hearts; and in the evening, 100 women, (their wives, daughters, &c.) were

regaled with tea and cake; and ample justice having been done to the excellent fare so bountifully provided. A variety of rural sports followed, which continued till midnight, when the joyous party retired to their houses, having passed an exceedingly happy day. The tables laid out in a field adjoining the village, and Lady Carew, T. Carew, Esq. and his lady, with other members of this much respected family were present, and were highly gratified on witnessing the manner in which everyone enjoyed the treat. In the evening the respectable yeomen of the parish were entertained at supper, at her ladyship's desire, the large school rooms being fitted up for the occasion. Mr. A. White, Lady Carew's steward, presided; and on the removal of the cloth, the loyal and patriotic toasts being drunk, the health of her Ladyship was given, and received with every possible enthusiasm: and long life and happiness to Lady Carew was responded to from every bosom, - her Ladyship's kindness of heart, and her benevolence to the poor in particular, having greatly endeared her to all classes in the neighbourhood.

Parishioners' views and expectations dominated the September meeting, as the results of the Housing Needs Survey and Parish Plan questionnaire were announced. Rural Housing Needs Officer John Scott will be presenting the Draft Housing Needs report at the November meeting, and its findings are yet to be confirmed - however, it does suggest that 8 affordable homes will be needed in the Parish.

<u>The Parish Plan Survey</u> was completed by 356 parishioners and broadly supported the issues brought to Parish Council Meetings by your Councillors. The majority of respondents consider:

- More employment is needed in the Parish, particularly in Agriculture (60%)
- More tourism should be encouraged in the Parish (48%) and that visitors need more information on the Parish (45%)

- More facilities of local schools should be available to the local community outside school hours (49%)
- Non-school-time facilities for young people aged 15-24 were poor (33%)
- The footpath network for walking and riding in the Parish was generally suitable (71%)
- The following should be done to roads, lanes and paths to make the local countryside better: Remove litter (48%); keep roadside verges mown and tidy (39%); signpost paths and bridleways (37%); and open more footpaths and bridleways (34%). Only 22% respondents wanted to let the roadside verges grow for wildlife
- More maps of public footpaths and bridleways should be put up in the Parish (92%)
- Dogs mess is a problem in the Parish (37%) although 32% considered it was not a problem
- More dog waste bins are needed in the Parish (39%)
- A renewable energy source would be useful for the Parish (37%)
- Speeding traffic is seen as the main crime and safety concern (56%), although 35% of respondents would not wish to see further speed restrictions
- Road maintenance needs improving in the Parish (49%)
- More local outdoor sports facilities are needed for children up to 16 (41%)
- The village halls are adequate for the needs of the Parish (69%)
- The level of service provided by the Parish Council was Good (25%) or Reasonable (35%) and that your elected representatives on the Parish Council was sufficiently aware of local concerns and feelings (74%)
- The degree of planning control in the Parish was reasonable (34%) and that sufficient publicity was given to planning applications (41%)
- The Parish should develop as a balanced community (61%)
- They would support development of affordable housing for local people in the Parish if there was a proven need (88%)

This is just a small snapshot of the findings of the survey - for the full survey, have a look at the Parish Council website, ugboroughparishcouncil.gov.uk. The next step is to prepare the Parish Plan, based on the findings of the survey.

<u>Dogs Mess</u> is a recurrent issue - this time, complaints had been received that bags of dogs mess were being hung along the hedgerow in the lane above Hillside, Bittaford. SHDC Street Scene Officers will be keeping an eye on the problem and will be imposing Fixed Penalty fines of £75 or more - over £2000 following prosecution in the Magistrates Court.



<u>Tree Preservation Orders</u> Councillors objected to the proposed TPO of the ash tree south of 13-14 Seldons Close, Ugborough on the grounds that the tree may need remedial work and the leaves constituted a hazard on the footpath. The proposed TPO at Hill House, Ugborough - to which the Parish Council had objected - has been 'reassessed', so that the Monterey Cyprus can be felled, provided it is replaced by a Katsura (don't ask me what that is!).

The next Parish Council meeting will be held at 7.30pm on Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> October. You are welcome to attend.

#### **REGISTER OF ELECTORS 2010**

- (1) The Register of Electors is compiled each year with a qualifying date of the 15<sup>th</sup> October.
- (2) Information is required by law from each household annually forms will be sent out at the beginning of September. If you don't receive one contact South Hams District Council Electoral Registration Office (01803) 861434.



- (3) Electors whose details are printed correctly on the form may register using the automated freephone number (if the telephone you are using has touch-tone dialling), or via the internet using the security numbers printed on the form.
- (4) Persons who do not register may be liable for a fine of up to £1000.
- (5) Only those persons whose names appear on the Register will be entitled to vote.
- (6) You have some choice about who can buy your details. The Electoral Registration Officer must publish two registers: the full version and an edited version.
- IF YOU PLACE A CROSS in the box on the registration form for exclusion from the edited register, your name and address will only appear on the full register which will only be used for certain lawful purposes, such as elections, law enforcement and checking applications for credit.
- IF YOU DO NOT PLACE A CROSS in the box on the registration form your name will also appear on the edited version of the register which anyone can buy this means anyone can use your details for any purpose.
- (7) If you are unable to vote in person at elections you may apply to vote by post or proxy just place cross in the appropriate column on the form. If you already have a postal or proxy vote the form will indicate this.
- (8) The qualifying date is 15 October but any forms received before the middle of November will be processed before publication of the Register of Electors on 1 December.
- (9) To avoid a visit from inspectors please respond by 15 October.

### Church news- Honour for Peter Povey

The Revd. Dr. Peter Povey has recently been elected and installed as Master of the Worshipful Company of Carpenters of the City of London. The history of the Carpenters' Company goes back over 700 years, with the first written reference being a mention of a Master Carpenter in the City of London's records of 1271. It was originally a medieval trade guild, set up to look after the welfare and interests of carpenters living and working in London - one of a number of ancient guilds being created at this time. Its first Book of Ordinances dates from 1333. The Company received its first Royal Charter in 1477, and in 1515 was ranked 26 in order of precedence out of the 48 City Livery Companies then existing. There are now 110 Companies in the City, two without livery.

The Company's considerable influence over the building trade reduced after the Great Fire of 1666, when many timber buildings were rebuilt in brick and stone. However, the Company, unlike some others, still retains close links with its original craft and remains true to the spirit of its founders. It continues to support a broad range of charitable and educational activities, and to encourage and promote the highest standards of woodworking craftsmanship. The Company has its own Building Crafts College with over 700 students, housed in purpose built premises in Stratford, East London, just 200 metres from the main 2012 Olympic site; it maintains historic Almshouses in Godalming; and manages a convalescent home, open to all, at Rustington on the West Sussex coast.

During his year of office, Peter will preside at the Company's Court meetings and various entertainments, including the November Livery Dinner attended by the Lord Mayor of London and the Sheriffs. With his wife Ann, Peter will represent the Carpenters' Company at a wide variety of functions in London, including at the Guildhall, the Mansion House and St. Paul's Cathedral. Further afield he will visit York, Glasgow and Sheffield, as well as visiting the Company's Service affiliates, the Royal Navy's new Type 45 destroyer HMS Daring, and 4 RIFLES.

Somehow I felt I had discovered something about life in general, a bit of self knowledge, a lesson about the nature of the spiritual life .....
