

Unbelievably £4,250.00 we raised for the pre-school, breakfast and after school club children – an amazing result from everyone's hard work. This will be an important step in the development of our plans for a building on the school site!

The children are thoroughly enjoying the freedoms the better weather brings an love experiencing the long grass, flowers and mud in our rural environment. A

Forest School the children have been doing crayon rubbings, enacting pulling themselves up 'steep mountains', whilst the rope swing is also proving extremely popular. Inside, the children have been sowing cress pots and runner beans (the latter which shot up over half term) and they have enjoyed observing these grow alongside their 'Jack and the Beanstalk' display.

The boys and girls always relish 'Baking Wednesdays' and have made sandwiches, cutting them into squares, rectangles and triangles and jam tarts, involving practising rolling, cutting and scooping.

On Polling day the children took the opportunity to visit Paignton Zoo, returning with stories of shrimp-eating flamingos, baby giraffes and swimming crocodiles! July is also full of activities: The first week sees the Pre-Schoolers' own Sports Day. The keen participants have been practicing keeping bean bags on their heads and balancing rubbers on spoons in preparation for some of the activities. Weather permitting, the children will then be inviting their Teddy Bear's to picnic with them mid-July. The last day of the summer term then sees the group come together for an end of year party and Leavers' Celebration.

The close links with Ugborough Primary make the transition up to 'Big School' a smooth one for many. This Celebration is a chance to reflect on many of the formative experiences these young children have had during their time at Pre-School and to be thankful for the excellent provision the staff continue to provide.



#### Rainfall at Shellwood Hill George Arnison

After a lovely, dry April, we had a return to 'business as usual' in May when I recorded 103mm (just over 4") of rain at Shellwood Hill. This compares to my eight year average for May of 72mm, and the previous four Mays of 61.5mm (2016), 93mm (2015), 120mm (2014) and 85mm (2013).



## Beryl's Bookworms - Ann Povey

For our June read we looked at 'My Brilliant Friend' by Elena Ferrante, the first of a series of four books dubbed "The Neapolitan Novels" translated from the Italian by Ann Goldstein



of "The New Yorker" magazine. There was a mixed response to the book. Whilst it was well written, beautiful and descriptive, it is a meaty book, and was said to be an 'artichoke'\* of a book, meaning hard to read! (\*For our vegetarian members!) The narrator having the same name as the author set us all discussing who the

author really is, as she declines to be interviewed, although people worldwide have made attempts to guess her identity. Elena Ferrante wants her books to speak for themselves, and for readers not to reflect on who wrote them.

The book starts with a prologue with a 66 year old Elena Greco getting a call from her lifetime friend Lila Cerullo's son to say his mother had vanished leaving no trace behind her. The narrator Elena then decides to write the whole story of her life with Lila, and begins with telling of their childhood in a poverty-stricken district outside Naples, growing up on rough streets, in close proximity with other

families who are invariably at each other's throats! Abuse and brutality are c everyday occurrence. Lila has the ability to learn easily from a very early age, an together she and Elena work though languages and literature, one self-taught, th other passing exams and moving into higher education, yet with elements c competitiveness and rivalry. The story follows their hard lives and loves, up t Lila's marriage at the age of sixteen to a local self-made man of the district. In very personal scene at the end of the book, Lila insists that Elena continues he studies and says to her

"You're my brilliant friend. You have to be the best of all ...". Hopefully, who happens next can be found in the subsequent novels.

The scores given reflected the varying views on this book, but again averaged or at 3.75 out of five.

Your Stars Tonight. I have been accompanying the steamed dietor on a journey to Ireland via Lundy, Cornwall, Brittany and Wales. It seems to have turned into a Standing Stones and Dolmen tour as we drive round the corner only to find another relic left by our Neolithic

ancestors. They were the first humans to invent farming and like a rising tide rippled out from the Middle East around 8000 BC. They covered Western Europe from Spain via Ireland and the Orkneys all the way to Sweden in the next 4000 years, leaving a legacy of graves and monuments. My personal favourite (so far) has been the river of standing stones at Carnac which winds for miles across Brittany in a bizarrely mysterious logic. A clear moonless night on the Cape de Raz gave me an opportunity to ponder their makers' mindset and also to find a personal peace with the loss of several friends and loved ones in the last year.

As dusk finally deepened into night I settled down with my binoculars in the summer warmth of the silent campsite and first found the kite shape of the constellation of *Boötes* which would be my guide to finding the elusive comet C/2015 Johnson. Unfortunately *Boötes* was almost directly overhead and the resultant stiff neck was scarcely rewarded when I eventually found its faint hazy patch of light. By the beginning of July it will have faded before disappearing into the furthest limits of the Solar System for eternity.

I then did the astronomical version of Sudoku - trying to pick out the faint stars that make up the constellation Draco Serpens using a star atlas. Its distinctive triangular head was surprisingly easy to find just below *Boötes* - but being a serpent, the constellation sinuously winds around nearly one sixth of the sky and this made star hopping navigation hard work.

That brought me down to the southern horizon and the "T" of the upraised tail of Scorpius, with the deep red bright star Antares marking the head of the Scorpion – a constellation which always makes me feel slightly nervous. And then Saturn rose above the horizon just to the west. Through the binoculars it appeared like a flattened mandarin orange because its rings are inclined towards us almost doubling the apparent size. Sadly this time around Saturn is very low in the night sky and as a result the distortions of the atmosphere make a clear view difficult.

It was now well past one o'clock , my eyes were now fully adapted to night vision and it was the darkest hour. I was rewarded by the gorgeous beauty of the Milky Way arcing across the sky. Viewed with the binoculars it becomes a river of stars beyond counting.

Life and death, ripples of humanity, rivers of menhirs, rivers of stars, warm summer nights and the cold eternity of stars - what does it all mean? If only the steamed dietor would let me have another pint of this delicious Galway Guinness then I am sure all will become clear.

A packed public session started the June Parish Council Meeting, to discuss the planning application for a care home for up to 5 boys at Quillet, Wrangaton. The Parish Council listened to the concerns of local residents and objected to the proposal on the grounds of traffic generation, the absence of amenities and supporting community in Wrangaton, and queried the adequacy of septic tar arrangements

- Creation of two pitches (mobile home and touring caravan) for use as private gypsy/traveller site at The Paddock, Ivybridge Ref 1395/17/FUL Support, subject to usage being restricted to applicant
- Readvertisement (revised plans received) Demolition of existing bungalow, erection of 38 dwellings, provision of new access and erection of 3m high solid timber acoustic fence on boundary with A38 Ref 2208/16/FUL Strongvox Homes Neutral
- Prior approval for proposed change of use of agricultural building to a dwellinghouse (Class C3) and associated operational development at The Barn, The Shippen, Marridge Farm, Ugborough Ref 1792/17/DPR No comment
- 6. Reserved Matters application for replacement of redundant agricultural buildings following grant of outline approval 3046/16/OPA adjacent to Wool Barn, Langford Barton, Ugborough Ref 1809/17/ARM Mr & Mrs A Prowse Neutral

The bus shelter in Bittaford has been made more weather proof, thanks to the hard work of Cllr Laurie Nelson and Viv Howard. Laurie also intends to repaint Bittaford's other bus shelter and, together with the new landscape planting, the heart of Bittaford certainly looks smarter.

The Annual Parish Council Accounts formed the focus of discussion, following receipt of the internal auditor's report - which did not reveal any major issues. Over the last year, balances have increased from £24,350 to £34,000, although much of that increase is for earmarked projects, such as the planned clamberstack at Bittaford playground. Day-to-day expenses, such as administration, remained little altered, with the main increases in expenditure relating to playground maintenance and the community lengthsman service (some of which was grantaided). Transparency Code legislation requires that the accounts are displayed on the Parish Council website - have a look at https://ugboroughparishcouncil.org/parish-council-accounts/201617-audit/

Travellers at Hillhead continue to be an issue within the Parish. However, Cllr John Tucker, Leader of SHDC, has appreciated our concerns and promised the Parish Council that it was '...likely that an enforcement notice will be issued very soon'. So watch this space (again).

## A letter from our Priest in Charge- Rev'd David Sayle

This last week and the forthcoming weeks are full of wonderful community fetes and activities, which bring our communities together in expectation, joy and happiness. It is a privilege to be part of these community forming events but I write at a time when many communities are experiencing such a heavy pain and loss and naturally our thoughts and prayers are with all those caught in the midst of these tragic and life changing experiences.

As a Church, we have recently finished the 10 days of prayer, entitled 'ThyKingdomCome', in which different churches from eight five countries were involved. Our Archbishop, Justin Welby, described it as an "extraordinary joining together of Christians all around the world to pray two prayers" and our own local experience as we travelled from church to church in the Mission Community was a real sense of God's presence especially as we were joined by different people both from within our Mission Community and the surrounding areas. The big question now is what next and our Archbishop has raised this same question, if you wish to hear his answer, you can watch it at @thykingdom\_come.

Here in our Mission Community as we too constantly seem to 'sigh' whenever we hear a news bulletin, can I suggest whether praying is part of your regular day or not, that we pledge to take a moment each day, to be still, to be quiet to reflect and then to simply say the only prayer, Jesus has asked us to say,
