



Rainfall at Shellwood Hill George Arnison

October continued where September left off weather wise...rain, rain, and more rain....not in particularly unusual quantities, but just unremittingly wet. At Shellwood Hill I recorded 267.5mm (10.5") during the month which compares to my rolling average for Octobers of 150mm. It was the wettest month of the year so far - by some way (September being the second wettest); and also the wettest October in the last ten years, after a few years of relatively dry Octobers.





Beryl's Bookworms - Norma Roe

Attendance at this month's meeting was somewhat depleted by conflicting pantomime rehearsals, but several of our keen thespians still sent their views on our book choice- Three Things about Elsie by Joanna Cannon.



First, we learned a little about the author, who surprisingly left school with one O level and had a series of different jobs, including barmaid and pizza delivery before returning to education and studying to become a doctor, specialising in psychiatry. A horrific and damaging accident in her 20's greatly affected her self-image, and when her first novel, (The Trouble with Goats and Sheep), became such a huge success, she found the resultant publicity and requests for photos challenging. She is now a full-time writer but her experiences in general practice and in her specialism have led her to a real understanding of people- she treats her characters with care and compassion.

The book opens with 84-year-old Florence Claybourne, a resident of Cherry Tree Home of the Elderly, on the floor of her room where she has fallen. She reflects and remembers her life, particularly a man who has recently arrived in the Home who is not who he says she is but someone who had a profound effect on her in the past-something that is a great secret that she has never told.

Her greatest friend is another resident at the Home- Elsie. We are told two of the things about Elsie- she is Florence's best friend, she always knows what to say to make her feel better, but the third is not disclosed until near the end.

This book is beautifully written and there were so many passages that could have been quoted- we enjoyed reading a few aloud. The characters of Florence and Elsie were very sympathetically drawn, but also Jack, Miss Ambrose, Handy Simon and the baddie- Ronnie Butler came alive off the page.

The pace was a little slow for some members, but the majority found it a very worthwhile read- at times funny, often poignant and very compassionate.

We gave it a score of 4 out of 5.

Our book for next month is Intrigue in Covent Garden by Susanna Gregory and our Christmas celebrations begin!



<u>Your Stars Tonight</u> I have been reading Stephen Fry's recent book - *Mythos* — which is a retelling of the Greek myths. I have to admit I started reading it with little enthusiasm and even less expectation that I would finish it, let alone enjoy it. But it was addictive reading, full of unexpected surprises especially about the origin of so many "English" words and sayings — and of course a plethora of astronomical names.

A good illustration is the southern night sky as seen from my back garden in December. Spoiler Alert – if you have already looked at George Arnison's "Rainfall at Shellwood Hill" in this Newsletter then you can guess what the future holds for Ugborough's starry nights in December - pneumonia, trench foot and risk of drowning. However, always optimistic, let us assume a star does manage to penetrate the seasonal murk in the southern sky. It is likely to be the bright red- orange of Aldebaran that will first catch your eye. It glares from the head of Taurus, the bull, which is the fainter V of stars surrounding it.

Long before the Greeks, the Egyptians had named this constellation after Osiris, the bullgod (and god of the Nile). The Greeks told their own story about this constellation in which Zeus turned into a beautiful white bull. My rather battered childhood copy of "Introducing Astronomy," printed in "mcmli", feels like a relic of bygone ages, particularly when it coyly tries to describe the rest of the myth – in which Zeus "burning with desire for the Phoenician princess Europa" carried her off to Crete.

Meanwhile, back in the mythical clear night sky above Ugborough, the scattering of stars around Aldebaran is called the Hyades after the five sisters of Atlas. According to the Greeks, Zeus put them there after they had pined to death when their brother Hyas had been gored and killed by a boar. And in the Mediterranean they are associated with rain — possibly because the first sight of these stars in autumn heralds the rainy season.

The Hyades are a fine sight through the binoculars, but the gems in this area are the Pleiades open cluster of stars, which are reminiscent of a shrunk down copy of the Plough constellation, covering less than the area of the moon. With the naked eye six or seven stars should be visible - unless you are blessed with really good eyesight when you may see up to ten stars in the group. But with binoculars they become dozens of pinpoint sharp stars shining with a hard blue tinted light from these relatively young and hot blue stars.

Through binoculars there is just the faintest hint of a haze around the stars which is caused by the intense light of these stars reflecting off a cloud of interstellar cosmic dust. On the only clear evening we had in November I was able to take a long exposure photograph of the Pleiades just before the clouds rolled over Ugborough again. I managed to capture these in their full glory of a beautiful shade of blue against the black background — check out Pleiades on Wikipedia to see a much better image than mine. What caught my eye were the patterns and shapes in the nebula clouds — in particular the one nearest the brightest star Merope looks like wisps of cloud with a patch of interstellar rain sweeping towards Ugborough.

I think the weather is getting to me!

Twelve members of the public attended the start of the November Parish Council Meeting, down from the September & October meetings, but still pretty impressive – the



meeting was held downstairs to enable a less mobile resident to attend (something that can be arranged if the Clerk is given reasonable notice). Concerns included the closure of the Ugborough public toilets, amendments to the double yellow lines in Wrangaton, and planning application 2468/19/HHO at Wynric, Ware Hill, Ugborough – amended plans are due for this application, so it is likely that the recommendation will be reviewed.

County Councillor Richard Hosking reported that:

- Grit bins would be replenished on a request basis, in preparation for the wintry weather. This can be done on the DCC website, https://www.devon.gov.uk/roadsandtransport/report-a-problem/
- DCC were 'on task' to solve the flooding on the Moorhaven to Glazebrook lane, although no time limit was given, nor for the works to Workhouse Brook lane, which is also flooded.
- Connecting Devon & Somerset is aiming for download speeds of at least 30 Mbps and
 re carrying out a consultation on existing speeds. The consultation is announced on
 https://www.connectingdevonandsomerset.co.uk/, but I could not find any way of
 participating.

Planning applications considered at the Meeting (with recommendations in **bold** & weblinks available on the e-newsletter):

- 1. Proposed conversion of garage to dependant residential unit at Ludd Farm, Ugborough Ref 2873/19/FUL **Support**, **subject to the dwelling being ancillary to the main residence**
- 2. Proposal: T1: Beech Crown height reduction by 1.5m and lateral reduction by 1.5m on all sides, crown raise to approx. 2m from ground level, crown thin by 20%. T2: Pittisporum
- Crown height reduction by 1.5m and lateral reduction by 0.5m on North, East and West sides. Reasons -To reduce shading of properties and avoid damage to neighbouring property's roof at 6 Lutterburn Street, Ugborough Ref 3282/19/TCA_Delegated to Cllr Johns
- 3. Proposed installation of a Peaking Gas Generation Plant with associated development to include vehicular access and security fencing at Land at Ermington Road Ivybridge 3354/19/FUL Neutral, subject to a condition requiring the planting of mature trees (10 years plus) along the boundary of the site to progressively screen the generators in future years. This would provide landscape improvement and some carbon sequestration to offset a little of the mains gas used to power the generators.
- 4. Demolition of stable block and erection of replacement barn at Cheston Farm, Wrangaton Ref <u>0496/19</u> **Support**

District Councillor Vic Abbott highlighted concerns by the RSPCA over distress to pets, farm animals and wild animals from fireworks. It is campaigning for regulation changes, and you can get involved by going to

The Parish Council has declared a Climate Emergency and will discuss the principles of its declaration at the December meeting. District ClIr Tom Holway reported that SHDC was setting up a web page on Climate Change and would be asking for residents to submit ideas. And the Net-Zero Task Force would be delivering the Devon Carbon Plan – more details at https://www.devonclimateemergency.org.uk/

A 'Warm Home Fund' has been secured by SHDC: 'Those residents of households who are struggling to pay heating bills and living in a cold home without a gas supply will be offered help. A letter from our Rector- Rev'd David Sayle Christmas at your church, Christmas in your Mission Community



Christmas is one of the loveliest times to visit a church. In our Mission Community we will have special services for children and families, such as Christingles, Carol services. Here's an outline of what to expect at your church over the festive season.

Christingle services use a special symbol, a decorated orange, to explore the story of God's love for the world at Christmas.

- The orange represents the world.
- Fruits or sweets which are pinned to the orange represent God's creation and the blessings of the seasons.
- The candle embedded in the orange represents Jesus, the light of the world bringing hope to those in darkness.
- The red ribbon round the orange represents the love of God and the blood of Jesus.

Our Christingle services will take place at Sunday 1st December 4.30 p.m. Diptford Church Saturday 14th December 4 p.m. Ermington Church

Tuesday 24th December 4 p.m. Ugborough Church, (there will be no Messy Church this month)

Crib service
