

Traffic Speed on the B3213 - Jon May

A new Community Speedwatch Group has been formed to monitor traffic speeds along the road from Wrangaton to Ivybridge. The volunteers have been given a radar speed gun by Devon and Cornwall Police and trained in recording the traffic at three sites along the road. Any vehicles found speeding in the 30mph zones will be notified to the police, who will send the vehicle's registered owners a letter warning them about the dangers of speeding. These letters have been found to be very effective in improving drivers' behaviour.

The group is small at the moment, but the more people who volunteer to help out occasionally, the more monitoring sessions can be run.

Creating a community where it's easy to live sustainably

Our big project this summer and autumn is supporting At Your Convenience CIC to keep the Bittaford and Ugborough public toilets in community ownership. An exciting range of suggestions for their use has been discussed. We welcome help from anyone in the parish, especially if you have business skills of any sort and can help with legal advice or grant writing.

Our proposal to SHDC is to convert each building into one unisex accessible toilet with disabled access and a multi-use community space. We are submitting our business plan and are applying for grant funding.

With the nights drawing in, now is a good time to borrow GUP's thermal imaging camera to check your home for hotspots, places where heat is leaking out rather than staying on the inside to keep you warm. As central heating comes on, draught sealing and insulation can make a big difference to household bills as well as comfort. The camera is easy to use and gives an instant picture of your home's heat performance, highlighting places where heat is escaping so you know where best to target your insulation efforts. We were interested to read Defra's advice on hedge cutting, encouraging landowners to trim hedges every two or three years rather than annually. This cutting regime saves time and money and dramatically improves the value of hedges for wildlife. There are also increased grants for traditional hedgelaying.

Historical Nugget– *Gareth 'Taff' Jones*

Ancient Rome is the place first recorded where traders hung bunches of vine leaves outside a bar to indicate they sold wine. The Romans brought the practice over to Britain and hung bushes outside of inns, names such as *The Bush*, *The Hollybush*, *The Bull and Bush* survive to this day. Monty Python missed this Roman legacy in their, 'What did the Romans ever do for us' scene!

From our rural heritage we have names such as *The Barley Mow, The Thatcher's Arms, The Wheatsheaf* and from industry; names such as *The Railway, The Miner's Arms* and *The Stonemasons*. Of course, there are many inns named after our monarchs and their battles *The Queen's Arms, The Royal Oak, The George* and *The Crown* to name a few. Some are tributes to the famous, *The Nelson, The Nell Gwyn, The Albert* in Totnes was named in honour of Prince Albert, consort to Queen Victoria, but the inn sign now depicts Albert Einstein (a sign of the times to excuse the pun). After the Battle of Warburg (1760), The Marquis of Granby set up many of his non-commissioned officers as publicans, in gratitude they named their inns after him (there is one down in Stonehouse), the marquis died leaving many debts!

Sports are remembered by such names as *The Bear* (bear baiting) *The Cock* (cock fighting) *The Cross Foxes* (fox hunting). Travel too is remembered with names such as *The Coach and Horses, The Horse and Groom* and more recently, *The* [Railway] *Station Bar*. Tradesmen are represented in names such as *The Blacksmith, The Carpenter's Arms* and *The Farrier*. From our seaports we can find the names of Admirals and famous ships, *The Admiral MacBride* on the Barbican, Nelson has already been mentioned but ships names such as *The Victory* and many others survive to this day.

I'll end on one close to our hearts, *The Ship Inn* and *The Anchor*, both of course found in Ugborough and many a tale has been told that they are named after the press gangs that came out from Plymouth in search of sailors to man the warships of the Royal Navy. However, as Dr Elaine Murphy an expert on 17th and 18th century maritime history, pointed out to me... "Why would you walk fifteen miles into the countryside to capture men who were not seafarers and therefore of little use to the press gangs, all the sailors, trawlermen etc lived in and around Plymouth and there was less chance of them escaping from the bars and taverns around the docks?"

Along with *The Mitre* and *The Church House Inn*, both names are from religious influences... The Ship is a reference to Noah's Ark and The Anchor refers to the Christian faith; the inns' names were probably adopted as St Peter's Church was being built in the fourteenth century, cheers!

e.g. Great Expectations, little Women, Harry Potter!

The Lincoln Highway starts with the central character, 18-year-old Emmett, returning home after serving a short sentence at a youth work farm for involuntary manslaughter. However, by page 30ish out of a near 600, it quickly becomes apparent that Emmett's brother and friends are going to be pivotal too in this madcap journey. Billy, Emmett's much younger, quirky brother and his friends Woolly and Duchess come with their own back stories and influence on Emmett's intended trip to find his long-lost Mother.

Towles rings the changes by telling the individuals stories in both 1st and 3rd person narrative, he abandons quotation marks (and replaces them with 'em dashes' -) and numbers the chapters backwards from 10 -1.

One reviewer suggests this is an author just trying to be 'literary clever'. However, from our small book group and the vast majority of 250,000 odd ratings on Goodreads, these changes go unnoticed and simply provide what Towles intended; pace, energy and warmth, making it a page turner despite its chunky size.

However, despite the books huge popularity with its much-loved characters by most, honest fans also recognise that if you look too deeply at the story lines they can be seen as implausible and even farcical, and the minority of readers even find the complex characters a bit cartoonish rather than believable.

The ending seems to wrap everything up but equally lends itself to interpretation, providing perfect material for a book group discussion, made even better in front of a cosy log fire this month and over another fantastic cake with tea and lots of laughs and chat! Perfect!

Overall score from Beryls Bookworms just under 4.5 out of 5 .

Your Stars Tonight Many years ago I had an alternative life as a research chemist. It was just after the post war flush of technological marvels and the white coated boffins were busy synthesising organic chemicals containing chlorine - the like of which had never existed on earth before. They promised a new age of chemical fixes — for example DDT - the insecticide which held

the promise to eradicate mosquito borne malaria.

Instead of chlorine my laboratory was looking at the possibilities of using fluorine and bromine in organic chemicals - I was working on pentafluoro phenyls while Stuart on the next bench was making pentabromophenyls. The rules of the game were simple, 10 new chemicals got you an academic paper, 100 got a PhD, and 1000 won tenure as a professor. But Stuart and I had a problem – our chemicals just sat there - oblivious to our chemical skills. Stew them in fuming nitric acid, boil them in caustic soda, roast them at red heat in oxygen – they were doggedly unenthusiastic about becoming new chemicals. It was very frustrating – we had unknowingly come across a whole new group of what are now called "Forever Chemicals" - chemicals that are so inert that they will not breakdown in nature even over thousands of years.

A few years later another chemist looked at Stuart's pentabromphenyl compounds and realised their inertness made them wonderful fire retardants for plastics. Soon they were being used in thousands of products - electrical goods, vehicle components, carpets and the plastic foam that filled furniture. It was another example of technology saving thousands of lives, in this case from fires in the home – and at a minimal cost. But, 20 years ago they were detected in mothers' milk. In 2018 the Environment Agency tested water from several English rivers that are used for abstracting drinking water – in all of them pentabromophenyls were found.

Where did they come from? Bury a discarded TV set and these chemical eventually leach out into the groundwater. Burn an old armchair on a 5th November bonfire and they go straight up with the smoke. Even modern "Waste to Energy" incinerators struggle to reach the 1000 degree plus temperature needed to break them down and across the country Forever Chemicals get spewed high into the atmosphere. Where do they end up? They love fats so they eventually end up setting up home in the body fats of living creatures and that includes you and me. What do they do? Currently we have no idea what they are doing to our planet's ecosystem.

Yet again we are shutting the environmental stable doors long after the horses have bolted At last the Environment Agency has tightened up the regulations on waste furniture — expect new rules next time you take your old foam filled settee to the lyybridge waste tip.

And let's also dispose of the much heralded Comet A3. To be fair - it was predicted that it could be a bit unreliable – but Ugborough's weather could always be relied on to make it a wash out. Meanwhile the steamed dietor and I were in the rain in the plains of southern Spain near Caceres when suddenly the clouds parted at sunset. As the dusk deepened the comet A3 suddenly popped into sight as a silver and golden curve of light barely visible against the orange grey dusk. 20 seconds later, the bright head disappeared behind a bank of cloud leaving only its faint golden tail proving it was not a figment of my imagination.

Two members of the public attended our October Meeting

Questions from the Public and Matters Arising from Previous Meetings

Representatives from "At Your Convenience" summarised plans for the two closed toilet blocks at Bittaford and Ugborough and the work that has been done to date. They explained that an offer would be made to SHDC in the first week of November and requested financial support from us to support the submission. As this topic was not on the agenda, we were unable to make a financial commitment, but we confirmed that we had agreed support in the past and that we would send confirmation of this.

We are very pleased that the new bus shelter at Wrangaton provided by the Developers is finally in situ and there have been very positive comments about it Our clerk has continued to chase Devon County Council to undertake the repair on the light on the Conduit to no avail and so we have now asked Cllr Thomas to pursue the matter.

Community Speedwatch Scheme

There are now 5 trained volunteers, and we are fully equipped to start this work with a few initial locations agreed along the B3213. (There are strict guidelines for safety reasons detailing where the operation can take place). The cameras don't work in the rain and so a date has to be agreed to suit conditions and availability of volunteers. The cameras produce reports on volume of traffic and speeds. First time offenders will receive a letter. If they offend a second time, they receive another letter, and a third time offence attracts an advisory visit from a police officer. Planning

There were several applications for different areas of work at Lower Bowcombe Farm and we supported them all commenting that we support the installation of solar panels on a listed building in line with the Councils Declaration of a Climate Emergency

2 Creber Drive, Wrangaton

Application for conversion of existing commercial unit/shop to residential dwelling. We are very disappointed that, once again, planning permission is being sought to convert the intended community / retail building into residential. We consider that this space should be available as a local community facility as stated in the original planning application for the development and believe the developers have made little effort to engage with the local community to promote this use. We have therefore refused to support this application and re-iterated our previous comment.

Ugborough West

We are continuing to pursue Plymouth City Bus regarding the cut to the 28 service to Ivybridge and liaise with DCC regarding the installation of a bus shelter at Davey's Cross

Speeding at Filham on the B3213 approaching David's Lane

Cllr Thomas has advised us that DCC have made it clear that a speed restriction on this bit of road was against DCC policy. Although we do have an option to pursue the matter through the Highways and Traffic Orders Committee it is not guaranteed that our application would be successful (even with a supporting petition from local residents) and, if there was a positive outcome, we would have to cover the costs — an estimated £7,000.

We have therefore reluctantly agreed to put this matter on hold for the present and focus on gathering data through the recently established speed watch initiative and a temporary speed warning camera.

Our next meeting is Wednesday 13th November at 7.30 p.m. in the upstairs meeting room of Ugborough Village Hall.





Rainfall at Shellwood Hill George Arnison

It felt like we had a bit of an 'Indian Summer' in the middle of September with a period of fine dry weather. But that came firmly to an end towards the end of the month when autumn kicked in properly with some very wet and windy weather. As a result, overall rainfall for the month was well above the average. At Shellwood Hill, I recorded 155mm (just over 6") of rain - compared to the month's average of 112mm. That's the 6th month this year so far that we've had 'above average' rainfall...which surely must guarantee 'below average' rainfall for the rest of the year - mustn't it?

STOP PRESS- H2Ohdear! River testing update. - Graham Gilbert

The recent heavy rain has highlighted issues (pun intended) concerning the Ugborough Water Treatment Works (UWTW). This was brought to the attention of one of your local Westcountry Rivers Trust Citizen Science Investigators by a concerned riparian landowner at Ludbrook.

The Bowcombe Brook (aka the Workhouse Brook) flows through their land and they noticed that the usually clear stream was brown and smelled of sewage. This seems to coincide with a notified spill from the UWTW that occurred on the 20th October from 06:26 to 07:49, all of which went into the Brook. So yours truly looked at South West Water's "Water Fit (a misnomer if ever there was one) Live" data for the UWTW and noted the following spill data:

2021 19 spills 2022 47 spills

2023 74 spills = 193.99 hours. The storm overflow rate on SSW's permit is 9 l/s. So 9l/s = $32.4\text{m}^3/\text{hour}$. $32.4\text{m}^3/\text{hour} \times 193.99$ hours = 6285.28m^3 . Thats enough to fill around 2.5 Olympic sized swimming pools.

The Settled Storm Overflow (SSO) discharged 6 times in 2023 for 26.05hrs. The flow rate as per the permit 6l/s. $6l/s = 21.6m^3/hour. 21.6m^3/hour. x 26.05 hrs = 562.58m^3$, which is the approximate total volume spilled from the SSO.

My thanks to one of our parish's scientific minds for the above calculations.
