The children have recently been focussing on the Mathematics curriculum strand (encompassing numbers and shape, space and measures) which is supported by activities ranging from jigsaws through to cookery and building with blocks. Meanwhile they have been learning some Makaton versions of songs; Makaton is a language programme using signs and symbols to help communication.

It can support spoken language and be used with speech.

All the different types of weather have been appreciated by the children and they are enjoying the seasonal changes as the year draws on. Having made firework pictures in the playground (dropping paint filled tea bags on black paper) and poppy pictures, which they displayed in the church for Remembrance Day, they now look ahead to Christmas. So, excitement is rippling through the Pre-School community.... On Wednesday 13th December, the children will be hosting their Christmas sing-along and party (Christmas jumpers at the ready!)

Update on Ugborough Bell Project

It seems a long time ago since No. 6 bell cracked in February 2015 and we started the Bell Restoration Project. Well, as you are all aware, the bell ringers have been active with their fund raising – the Flower Festival, Auction of Promises, Big Breakfast and a number of smaller events etc. Initially we set out to weld repair the big crack in No. 6 and the smaller cracks in Nos. 3 and 8 (the big bell that chimes on the hour) and rehang the bells on new fittings, at a projected cost of $\pounds70,000$.

In the meantime, Merryl Docker was carrying out some excellent research on the history of our bells and gave presentations of her findings to the Local History Group and to the Bellringers. In 1761, Ugborough Parish decided to recast the five old bells which made up the peal and add a sixth bell (the other two bells were cast later in 1813 to make the eight), with the bell founder, Thomas Bilbie of Cullumpton. The bells were installed in 1762 and were guaranteed for 12 months, however by 1765, they all had to be returned to the foundry for further work. In 1766, one of the bells had to be returned yet again for more work, but this time with another foundry. Looking again at the options that were available for our current project, the weld and repair option was only going to provide a five year guarantee for the welding. If a full recast was undertaken, the bells would be guaranteed for a 'lifetime', which should be well into the next century. In light of the problems facing our bellringing predecessors, the re-casting option was explored further, as this would provide the best solution from an engineering perspective.

The additional cost of a full recast was found to be an extra £21,000 over the original target of £70,000 and we have currently raised £60,000 through a combination of fundraising, donations and grants. To be allowed to re-cast we would also have had to get the Faculty (church building planning permission) amended. We have now been promised a substantial donation to enable the bells to be re-cast rather than welded and the Faculty amendment has been granted - our thanks to Peter Povey for navigating through the complex church system to achieve this in a timely manner.

Now that we have the Faculty in place, we are starting to have detailed contract discussions with Taylor's from Loughborough, who will be undertaking the work. We are hoping that the bells will be lowered down in the tower at around Easter 2018 with the bells being put back up late summer 2018. As part of the restoration package we are having new cast iron headstocks; these are currently

large pieces of wood with metal straps under which the bells are hung; the new headstocks will make the bells easier to ring. So once the restoration is complete in our church, which is locally known as the Cathedral of the South Hams, the bells will peal out again. They will also be tuneful for those that notice these things! Anyone who would like to learn is most welcome to come along to our practice night at 7.30 pm on a Thursday night - it is good fun and interesting to learn a new skill.

Fund raising still needs to continue, our next event being a Big Breakfast on 13th January 2018, culminating with a special event with the new bells on show in the church around August 2018. Anyone who would like to make a donation, please see Anthony or Juliet.

VISIT OF THE PLYMPTON RINGERS.-On New Year's day the village was honoured by a visit of the ringers of Plympton St. Mary church bells, about 16 in number, and the neighbourhood was enlivened by many peals on the Ugborough bells, and of such a style as has not been heard here for a long period. The popularity, both of the Plympton St. Mary bells and their ringers, extends throughout the whole of South Devon, and it is needless to say that their visit to Ugborough was most acceptable, as they soon proved how well they had mastered the art both of round and change ringing, under the able direction of Mr H. Stanbury, the treble map, who with Messrs J. Stanbury, W. Condy, T. Luke, J. Shephard, W. Mortram, J. Pugh, E. Pugh, J. Hill, J. Kenting, H. Hansford, W. Lavis, and John Hurrell (an old veteran aged 80 years, and last of the old set of the past generation) compose the set. They were evidently delighted with the Ugborough bells (which were recently rehung by the eminent firm of bell-hangers, Mesars Hooper and Son, of Woodbury,) and consequently are in good ringing condition. After partaking of a first-rate repast provided by Mr Geo. Wood, and served with his accustomed ability, a very pleasant evening was spent ; the party being joined by many of the Ugborough ringers who unanimously welcomed them to repeat their visit on a future occasion.



After an unusually wet September, October was a relatively dry month - and we hardly noticed the tail end of ex-Hurricane Ophelia (on the 16th) and Storm Brian (on the 21st) - both of which ended up going across Ireland. I recorded 98.5mm (just under 4") of rain at Shellwood Hill, which was well under my eight average of 145mm for the month, and compares to the last four Octobers of 80.5mm (2016), 99.0mm (2015, 179.0mm (2014) and 244.0mm (2013).

Beryl's Bookworms - Norma Roe

Our November book was Underground Railroad, by Coulson Whitehead- an unusual book choice for our group. It made for brutal and uncomfortable reading.



This book was a Pulitzer Prize winner (among other awards) and also endorsed by both Oprah Winfrey and Barack Obama and we could see why. The main character is Cora, a 15 year old slave on a cotton plantation in Georgia. All the hellish and horrible things you have ever read or seen about slavery are depicted here. When Caesar, a recent arrival from Virginia, tells Cora about an escape route called the Underground Railroad, they decide to take a terrifying risk and leave. They head north, but they are pursued relentlessly by the dreaded slave hunter, Ridgeway, from whom Cora's mother had escaped years before.

In Coulson Whitehead's novel the Underground Railroad is not the web of sympathisers who very riskily helped slaves to reach the North, but a real railroad with carriages, engineers and conductors who operate a secret network of tracks and tunnels.. (Some of us really disliked this bit of magic realism).

Cora and Caesar are hunted across many states, which allows Whitehead to explore how each one dealt with the perceived problem of an increasing black population. Some of these methods are equally as disturbing as the concept of slavery itself.

Sarah led us in our discussions and the background information about the real underground railway was most interesting. Apparently it helped an estimated 100,000 slaves to escape north by 1850. Also the main people involved used the terminology used by Whitehead- station master, conductor, cargo, stations or depots etc

In our opinion, a very worthy, but not enjoyable read and the average score of 3.5 does not really show the intensity of feelings expressed.

Our next meeting is party time!. Hooray!

Ugborough Square needs a tidy-up, and this is one of the issues discussed at the start of the Ugborough Parish Council Meeting. The Parish Council arranged, earlier this year, for the weeds in the Square to be treated, and now a general clearance is needed. It is hoped that some of the villagers who complained about the maintenance of the Square will come along and volunteer to tidy it up. A tidy-up day is planned for Saturday, 2nd December - for details, look out for the notice in the Newsletter and on the notice board.

Grit bins need replenishing before the cold winter weather sets in. Devon Highways will not be checking the grit bins, and is relying on members of the public to report bins which need replenishing.

• Rural workers live/work unit at Mammoth Trees, South Brent Ref 0523/17 Neutral, subject to the proposal satisfying the functional and financial tests of the Dartmoor Local Plan

The Travellers at Ivybridge Station car park (which lies within Ugborough Parish) have now been moved on, and the report on the clear-up afterwards, including human excrement, makes very unpleasant reading.

A mobile speed sign is to be erected along the Wrangaton Road in Wrangaton and Bittaford. The sign will activate if it senses that vehicles are going too fast - I have seen it in operation, and it really does slow down traffic speeds.

A letter from our Priest in Charge- Rev'd David Sayle

Countdown to Christmas

Advent is 'the final countdown' to Christmas day and many children will have an Advent calendar to help them count the days. It's also a really special time for the church. in this article you will find a few reasons why it's so special, and some Advent activities for children.

The word Advent simply means 'coming' - it's the season when Christians remember that God came to earth to be born as the Christ child, Jesus.

God also promised that Jesus will come again at the end of time to heal all the world's hurts and divisions. Advent remembers this amazing promise, so it's a time of hope, of getting ready, and expectation.

Waiting is hard, but Christmas is worth waiting for - it's a special time, and at its heart is a gift of love from God to the world. Perhaps you could talk to a member of your family or a close friend about which things concerning Christmas you find hard to wait for and which are worth saving until the day.

Here's what you might see in church during Advent:-

- Fewer decorations but there might be greenery instead of flowers. This allows us to recognise that the Christian life isn't all about celebration. It's about hope and faith during times of sadness and challenge, too. There have been many times in history when God's people have longed for God to come and save them, and there are times in our own life when we pray that God would come and help us, too. Those times can feel like a long, dark night. We long for the greenery to turn to flowers, just as we long for our sadness and our hope to turn to joy.
- An Advent wreath with candles on it. One candle is lit each week (usually at the start of the Sunday service) often with a special song or prayer.
- Many churches try really hard not to start Christmas too soon, maybe waiting till Christmas Eve to sing the carols. Saving the Christmas carols till Christmas itself means they feel even more special when you do sing them! Advent is a really important time to pray for peace and love to fill the world, so you may hear more of these kinds of prayers in church.
- In our Mission Community we are holding opportunities to think about 'Prayer' and especially the words of The Lord's Prayer. These will be held on Thursday 7th and 14th afternoons at 2.30 and evenings at 7.30 p.m. at different homes in Diptford and Ermington. Advent at home

If your family enjoys chocolate, you might like a Real Advent Calendar (*www.realadvent.co.uk*). These calendars have a piece of Belgian Fairtrade chocolate behind every window, plus an illustrated Christmas story booklet that you can read together as a family. A percentage of each purchase is also donated to a good cause.

There are other Advent calendars which present the Christmas story, like one offered on the Traidcraft website: *www.traidcraftshop.co.uk* by Divine chocolates. Both of these calendars are available at various stores too, while stocks last.

If you're holding off on the chocolate, an Advent candle is a lovely way to count down the days – it's marked with the numbers 1 to 25 so you can burn a little each day and still have enough left to light up your Christmas day. You can find them in Christian bookshops and some department stores.

If you believe that simple acts of kindness and creativity can make the world a better place, why not get hold of a Love Life Live Advent booklet (*www.liveadvent.net*). It's packed with thoughtful and practical actions that you can do together as a family to help you prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus at Christmas and to make your corner of the world a better place.

This year our Church at Harberton is holding a Christmas Tree Festival (see page 9) This got me thinking about how we use our Christmas trees over this holiday season and I came across this idea, which I would like to share with you and invite you to participate in.

Christmas Tree Prayers

Decorating the Christmas Tree is for a lot of people part of their Advent / Christmas ritual, which brings great excitement but if you would like your Christmas tree to mean even more this year, why not try this beautiful and thoughtful prayer idea?

- Buy some pretty gift tags (sparkly stars work well) or make some by cutting up last year's Christmas cards.
- Write on the plain side the names of people or situations that you want to pray about.

- Hang the gift tag prayers on your tree as a sparkly reminder just as your tree lights shine in the darkness, so your prayers are like a candle that lights up the lives of those in need.
- Christmas is a particularly difficult time if you are sad, or ill, or lonely or worried. Keep a few spare gift tags so you can add to your tree when you think of others who need your prayers.

Tip: If you know someone needs your prayers, but it's best if others don't know they're in need, why not just write their initial on the tag, or draw a heart shape – God will know you are thinking of them.
