<u>Historical Nugget</u>— Gareth 'Taff' Jones

9th April 1969 – Filton, Bristol, Britain's first (and so far only) supersonic airliner, Concorde 002, made its maiden flight with Captain Brian Trubshaw at the controls. The flight lasted a mere twenty-one minutes and came a month after the French made their maiden flight in Concorde 001. Trubshaw declared it a "wizard flight"!

Britain and France had plans to sell over 400 of these aircraft but in the end only twenty airframes were built. Of these Air France and British Airways were the sole customers operating seven aircraft each (the remaining six were non-commercial). After the fatal air crash of an Air France flight in July 2000, commercial flights were suspended until November 2001 but both fleets were retired in 2003. Of the twenty built, all but two are preserved and on display across Europe. One was scrapped in 1994 – the British example, Concorde 216 G-BOAF, flew to her new home at Filton, Bristol on 26th November 2003.

Beryl's Bookworms - Norma Roe

Just because you can do something, does it mean you should?

Seventh Son by Sebastian Faulks

Sebastian Faulks's novels are always serious, intelligent and compellingly readable. Although he is best known for historical fiction, he has a keen interest in science, particularly medical science. Seventh Son, his 16th novel, is set in near future It is divided into four parts between 2030 and 2056. Writing about the future compared with the past, there are no sources but everything in book is quite feasible-travel by driverless car, restrictions on flights,(with a personal long haul allowance), meat eating becoming a rarity, chips in wrists that allow entrance to the subway, a lack of cars; and (an invention but possible in the book's timeframe) a giant vacuum conveyance that pumps passengers along the Eastern seaboard. It gets hotter.

In researching the book Sebastian Faulks read about genetics, consulted geneticists, embryologists and Rebecca Wragg Sykes, the writer of the book- Kindred -which has so expanded our knowledge of Neanderthal life.

Neanderthals were around for 300,000 years and were very resourceful and hardy. They lived in different parts of world with different climates. Homo sapiens have been around for a third of that time, and are the last surviving type of human. In 2010 it was discovered that homo sapiens mated with Neanderthals. Sebastian Faulks' own DNA test showed 3.7% Neanderthal.

If other types of human had survived, maybe the human condition would be different and better, with no mental illness or dementia.

And so to the plot of The Seventh Son. In need of money to fund her research, a young American academic, Talissa Adam, offers her services as a surrogate mother to the London-based and extremely rich Parn Institute. Its ambitious creator, Lukas Parn, an Australian of Eastern European extraction, is fascinated by genetics and unscrupulous. His particular interest is in those humans, especially Neanderthal Man who preceded Homo Sapiens, and who mated with them.

Parn persuades his chief scientist, a man who is both ambitious and resentful, to commit a breach of professional ethics by secretly switching a would-be father's semen for Neanderthal semen from a recently discovered body preserved in ice.

So the child that Talissa carries, Seth, is created- a 50% Neanderthal -50% Sapiens human hybrid. He is a loving and much-loved child, in a very happy family situation. His parents, Alaric and Mary adore him, but notice some differences, which they assume are personality traits. He doesn't dream, has no appreciation of art, finds it difficult to make relationships with other children as he doesn't know what they want from him. He is amiable but solitary. He is very literal. He has an intuitive understanding of other creatures and senses when things are going to happen. He loves football and is a Crystal Palace fan. So in subtle ways he is like us but different. Talissa is allowed to meet him when he is 12 and both likes and feels responsible for

him. At the end of his school days, he studies engineering at Cambridge where he has friends keen on racing who are delighted to discover his affinity for horses and rare ability to pick winner.

Then, as you will expect, things begin to go wrong. The goings on at the Parn Institute are leaked and Seth has to go into hiding. And the pace of the book picks up so that the last 50 pages or so are almost like a thriller.

I must warn you that there is an unexpected sex scene at the end, which might upset some readers. Sebastian Faulks defends this by saying it was necessary, but you may not agree. Some of the Bookworms found this distasteful.

We had a very thoughtful discussion, and some found it a very interesting read, with a gripping plot and convincing characters. Others found too much science which made it a dull read. The scores reflected this variance of opinion, from 2 to 5 out of 5, and so again the average was 3.5.

Our next book is Death at the Sign of the Rook- the latest Kate Atkinson which features a favourite- Jackson Brodie.

Your Stars Tonight - Your litter today



Interesting what happens to good intentions: During Covid everyone was walking around the block and enthusing how much better they felt - but now it is a lonely exercise. What caused such a loss of motivation? Perhaps everyone got depressed by the inexorable rise in hedgerow litter and

began to think murderous thoughts about those who abuse the little bit of earth we have been blessed with.

I have passed the time in my lonely wanderings by undertaking an in-depth study of the litter found in the back lanes of Ugborough Parish. It soon becomes apparent there are three tribes competing for the title of Litteratti - and each has their own ecological niche.

Firstly, there is the restless band of builders and related trades who crisscross Devon to get to the next client, all the while shouting instructions into their mobile phones. They have little time for lunch and at the end of their nutritious meal of sausage rolls, Pot Noodles, crisps and chocolate confectionary they make an offering to the pagan gods that they follow by throwing out the wrappers, plastic containers and cans into the layby that has given them shelter.

Then there are more youthful groups who congregate in specific areas, presumably late of night as the partying heats up. The steamed dietor and I came across one of their favoured locations on the minor road that runs from Hookmoor Cross, near the allotments, up to Venn Cross on the way to Ladydown Farm. We soon lost count of the number of discarded cans - we realized we were looking at serious and serial littering. As we approached the brow of the hill the litter louting became organized with neatly tied black plastic bags full of empty cans cast into the hedge. And then we came across what must have been an offering to the dark forces – for there stuck provocatively in the hedge was a Morrisons "Bag for life". Impaled on the bramble and hawthorn it seemed to whimper – "Put me out of my misery – I thought I was going to be loved for a lifetime of fetching and carrying for environmentally caring owners only to find I have been betrayed and cast aside by their alcohol soused progeny". So, we took pity on its blighted dreams and used it to pick up the cans – after the first 100 we gave up counting and just kept litter picking until the lane was clear.

Inspired by this I felt impelled a few days later to do something about a blot on our local landscape which has developed over the last few months around the glass recycling skip at Hillhead Cross. I had become obsessed with trying to understand just what goes on in the mind of homo sapiens litterbug. Luckily Graham "the hedge" volunteered to join me and made sure that I took my anti-raging medication. Our sausage roll consuming friends had obviously felt that this was a good place to relieve themselves of both their food waste and their buckets and bags of house restoration rubbish - no doubt they have starving kiddies at home and can't afford the tip fees. But the person who left 3 black bags of hydrangea cuttings – were they some penniless OAP? And who would take a Prestige stainless steel saucepan (with lid) and leave it there? Or buy a posh flat pack bookshelf and take the empty box to the top

of the hill? By the time Graham and I had filled 6 plastic bags it looked a lot better – and we felt a lot better. We had learnt to balance our ying and yang forces with the ley lines of Hillhead Cross. Good thing we had done so – next morning I walked past to find someone had just left an empty 25 litre can of Adblue for the litter fairies to collect.

Yoga classes

Local yoga teacher, Faith Matthews, facilitates weekly classes here. These are small, personalised sessions (Fridays 9-10 a.m.) nestled above Ugborough on the first floor of the Village Hall.

Faith's approach is *Viniyoga* and in this tradition of yoga, mindful movement is used in harmony with conscious breathing. This helps to focus and calm the mind whilst developing flexibility and resilience. In *Viniyoga* postures and stretches are carefully personalised to suit individual needs and abilities.

Classes run weekly alongside school term times enabling students to develop their practice. If you can't make a class, Faith gives the option of attending one of her many other local classes in lieu, if there is space (Moorhaven - Fridays, South Brent – Monday, Wednesdays, Saturdays).

If you're interested in developing a supportive and sustainable yoga practice for health and wellbeing you can book a taster session, a 1-2-1, or join one of Faith's Saturday morning workshops (which this spring are all about *balance*) to see if the *Viniyoga* approach connects with you.

Ugborough Parish Council News from our March Meeting. Two members of the public attended the March meeting

Matters raised by the Public and Arising from Previous Meetings

- Clean Air Zone A member of the public noted that the school buses sat outside
 the school with their engines idling for up to 20 mins on occasion. He proposed
 that we consider creating a clean air zone. We will be considering this further at
 our April meeting and welcome any input you might wish to make either by
 emailing our clerk before the meeting or coming along on the night (We will be
 meeting in the upstairs room in Ugborough Village Hall)
- Speeding in Wrangaton A member of the public had sent photographs of his vehicle which had been damaged as a result of speeding traffic in Wrangaton.
 The Community Speed Watch team have undertaken monitoring in this area recently and Cllr May has responded with the following:

We set up the speedwatch group last year partly in response to complaints from residents in Wrangaton, but also because we wanted to measure traffic volumes and speeds before the possible development of an Aldi store in Filham, which will potentially increase traffic along the B3213. As well as the speedwatch group, the developers on the Sidings Cross houses were required to install a vehicle activated warning sign, which is run by the Highways department of Devon County Council. We are hoping that we will be able to obtain the data from this camera so that we can obtain an objective record of any worsening of the situation over time. Together with the Speedwatch data, this will help the Police decide where to locate speed cameras, and how often to visit the area.

You have probably seen us already at the junction of Green Lane, monitoring traffic travelling Eastwards towards the A38. We also have sites (which have to be approved by Devon & Cornwall Police) in Bittaford (both directions) and Filham (eastwards traffic again). We have run 12 sessions since the 15 January. Half of our sessions have taken place in Wrangaton, and of the 65 vehicles which we have recorded as exceeding the speed limit, 39 (60%) have been in Wrangaton, so it has slightly more than its share of offenders. Worse though, to record a vehicle as speeding, it has to be going at least 35mph - over half of all vehicles are in the unlogged 30-35 range, in line with national figures.

We have just received permission from the police to add a second recording site in Wrangaton so that we can also monitor Westbound traffic, so will be trying this location out too as soon as we have completed the official paperwork.

Crucially – this is a small group of local volunteers and if you or anyone you know would like to join the group, please email our clerk.

- 3. We are still working to establish ownership and responsibility for the **hedges on** the approach to the train station in lvybridge
- 4. **Flooding outside the school** DCC have replied that they will need to arrange for the highway drains in the area to be cleaned but that they are unsure of the source of the running water on the north east side of the road. They will carry out further investigations but will need to wait for a budget to be available to install some new positive drainage to pick this water up and pipe it into the existing highway drainage. We will continue to pursue this.
- 5. **Bus shelter at Filham** We are so happy finally to be able to report that all parties are happy with the proposed bus shelter and the installation of this long-awaited for facility will commence soon.
- 6. Following the January meeting with the Devon County Council **Flood Office**r in Ugborough Village we are pleased that the latest update from them is very positive, and various actions are in progress.

Report from County Councillor Dan Thomas

The full report is available on our website. It includes information on the budget and proposals for Local Government Re-organisation. Things are changing daily with this. We were slightly taken aback by the announcement that day from Plymouth City Council that confirmed the inclusion of Ugborough Parish in Plymouth City Council's proposed expansion as we had received no previous communication from them. You will be pleased to hear that we are now in touch with PCC, and we have been offered a briefing. (For some reason, their attempts to speak to us had been unsuccessful)

Report from District Councillors Alison Dewynter and Vic Abbott

The full report is available on our website and includes: Parking, apprenticeships, help for residents with damp and mould, Avian Flu, dementia awareness, Devolution and Local Government Re-organisation, Village Halls Week, investing in council homes, Hope Wood, bottle bank closures, dads and male carers, Ivybridge market consultation

Co-option to Council- We are delighted to welcome Councillor Alan Hall to Council. He comes with experience of working as a parish councillor in Somerset along with a range of useful skills gained through his employment over the years

Planning- We supported 3 planning applications:

- Replacement illuminated and non-illuminated signage (retrospective) Shell,
 Carew Service, Station, South Brent, Devon, TQ10 9ER
- Erection of 100 person covered standing area. Ivybridge Town Football Club, Ermington Road. Ivybridge. PL21 9ES
- Erection of covered yard, Windy Ridge. Ugborough.

And will be seeking the advice of our Tree Warden before commenting on the Tree applications at Hill House and Turtley Corn Mill.

We had received the following decisions made by South Hams District Council and Dartmoor National Park Authority since our last meeting:

- Work on a Birch 2 x Oak trees Bittaford Wood, Caravan Park , Bittaford TPO Exempt
- Work on a tree bordering the road known as Hillside at risk of falling into the road - Approved
- Work on a Scots Pine, 93 Hazel Lane, Ivybridge Approved
- High House Cottage, Bittaford. Replacement of redundant manege with new sand school for private equestrian use - Conditional Approval

Finance- We are pleased to grant fund £250 towards the Ugborough Newsletter from this year's budget and look forward to contributing to next year's publications. (*This is much appreciated-thank you-Ed.*)

Asset Management and Maintenance Work

- 1. Damaged wall to our burial ground We had received 3 quotations to repair the wall (£1037 and £2245 and £1800) and have employed John Widdicombe to undertake the work
- 2. Accessibility to the post box in Ugborough Square.- Three companies had been approached. Two were unable to take on the work due to various restrictions when working on Highways and reservations regarding possible solutions. We discussed the solution presented to us a fixed ramp (thanks to the member of public who volunteered to test this out!) but considered this to have the potential to cause accidents and we have decided to request that Devon County Council install a dropped kerb with formal road markings. This will potentially be a very expensive project and take a long time to come to fruition, but we will keep you up to date with developments.
- **3. Replacement bench in the Burial Ground** We had received four quotes (£514, £505, £596, £510). Cllr Holway will discuss the replacement with the person who donated the original bench, and we hope to replace this soon.

Community Statement- We have recently produced a Community Statement for our Devon Association who are reporting on the work of parish councils as part of the Local Government Review. It summarises what is important to you (our communities), what we do for our communities and what we would like to do for our communities if we had the legislative powers and adequate funding to do so. Water update- Graham Gilbert

What's on your Christmas book wish list? Mine usually features some sci-fi, the latest Robert Macfarlane, Jasper Fforde, Isabella Tree, etc. So when a very good friend gave me "The Science of Sewage" I can't say I was overjoyed. However, it turned out to be a Very Good Read, and one I've subsequently recommended to a number of people. And now I'm recommending it to you, dear reader.

You see, my friend and I, as you may be aware, are Citizen Science Volunteers for the Westcountry Rivers Trust. Once a month, usually, we visit our allotted spots on the Bowcombe Brook, Lud Brook, and the Erme to test the waters for phosphates, temperature, total dissolved solids, and turbidity (basically, how clear the water is). Sewage, of course, is discharged into our waterways, usually in such a state that it little affects water quality. But there are occasions, far too many of late, when untreated sewage from Combined Sewer Overflows (CSO) is allowed into our waterways where it has an impact, sometimes severe, on the aquatic ecosystem.

When we flush our loos, pour stuff down our sinks, take a shower, we think of these events in isolation, but when they're added up on a national scale the quantities involved are quite mind-boggling.

To quote from the above book: in the UK approximately 12 million tonnes (1 tonne = 1,000kg/2,200 lbs) go into the sewers **every day**. And it never stops flowing. About 2 million tonnes of it comes from 45 million toilets, or to put it another way, 2 billion litres/440 million gallons per day just from toilet flushing. But we're lucky: according to the World Health Organisation/ UNICEF, 2015) 2.4 billion or more people worldwide live with no sanitation.

So how are our streams doing? Well, normally not too bad, and in the event of a CSO discharge the water clears up fairly quickly. If you look at the Lud Brook, for instance, above Bittaford the phosphate levels are so low as to be undetectable (which you would expect) and the water is gin clear, but by the time it reaches the Erme the level has risen to 100ppb, rarely 200ppb. This increase is largely due to agricultural run-off.

On the Bowcombe Brook, however, phosphate levels are rarely, if ever, below 100ppb, and are usually between 200 and 300ppb, and the turbidity of the water is, on average, not as good as the Lud. There is also far less observable aquatic life in it than the Lud Brook, where otters have been recorded. I've hardly ever seen a fish in the Bowcombe Brook, but Trout, Salmon, Bullheads, Eels, and River Lamprey live in the Lud Brook.

To thrive, the Bowcombe Brook needs fewer, if any, CSO discharges from the Ugborough Water Treatment Works, as well as less agricultural run-off (which

includes fertilizers and animal waste). We can do our bit by being careful what we put down the drains.
