Ugborough Wassail Sunday 12th January 2025

You're cordially, or ciderally, invited to join in our 3rd annual Wassail which will again take place in the Brackenhill orchard, courtesy of Alex & Simon Pickstone, on Sunday January 12th. The orchard is in the field between the glamping site and Brackenhill, just up the lane from the school going towards Hill Head. Follow the signs!

The festivities start at 5 p.m. From 5.30 onwards food and drink will be available. Soup and baguette will be provided, as will cider and mulled apple juice. Ugborians are also invited to bring apple cake to share, as well as something to make a noise with (such as an old saucepan and wooden spoon). In order to reduce waste, please bring your own mug for your soup, as well as something to eat apple cake from. Bring a lantern or torch, wrap up warm, and wear wellies or hiking boots.

The music will start at 6pm, followed by the procession to the trees. We are most grateful to John Rawlinson of South Brent who has offered to be the Master of Ceremonies. John has extensive knowledge of wassailing (as well as being a very good musician) and is involved in the Stoke Gabriel wassail, easily the biggest and best-known event in the area. How Our Gardens Can Support Wildlife During the Colder Months

By making small adjustments to our gardens, we can provide a safe haven for nature even in the chill of winter. One key tip is to leave seed heads, berries, and fallen leaves in place—these provide vital food and shelter for birds, small mammals, and insects. Planting native shrubs and trees can offer a natural source of winter sustenance, and a well-placed birdbath or small pond (even if frozen, it can be topped up with water) helps wildlife stay hydrated. If possible, create a "wild corner" with logs, rocks, and tall grasses to offer shelter for hibernating creatures. Avoid cutting back perennials too early, as the dead stems and seed heads offer both food and cover.

Hedgehogs will benefit from fallen leaves that they can use to build nests. By late autumn, they will be looking for a safe, warm place to hibernate. Leaving areas of your garden undisturbed - piles of leaves, logs, or a small, quiet corner can provide a perfect hibernation spot. Make sure there are some gaps or holes in your garden fences, as hedgehogs need to roam several kilometres a night to find food.

Avoid using chemicals or slug pellets in your garden, even if they claim to be wildlife friendly!

If you see a hedgehog out during the day in cold weather, it may be under weight or unwell, so contact one of these local wildlife rescue services for advice.

<u>Ugborough Parish At Your Convenience: A Community Effort atyourconveniencecic@gmail.com</u>

As many of you are aware, when South Hams District Council announced they were selling the long-closed former public conveniences at Ugborough and Bittaford, many Parish residents came together with a shared belief that these community assets should remain as just that — facilities that are open, accessible and upgraded for community benefit.

In the past 6 months a dedicated group have formed *Ugborough Parish At Your Convenience CIC*, set up a bank account, undertaken community consultation, secured renovation advice and quotes and applied for funding. All of this has fed into a business plan which, at the time of writing, has JUST been submitted to SHDC. This outlines our aim to secure, renovate and maintain both public conveniences — each with accessible unisex loo, baby change and adjacent multi-purpose community focussed space.

We believe that these public services (which are otherwise at risk of being lost) would have a hugely positive impact here (in a multitude of areas including health, sustainability and Active Travel) if reopened in this way.

A core group of individuals have put a tremendous amount of time, effort and energy in to this business plan which is hugely appreciated. Much of this work is still ongoing. Thank you!

Whilst we wait to hear of SHDC's decision we'd like to thank the Parish Council and the variety of local Community groups for their support.

Beryl's Bookworms -

This month's book was The Secret Hours by Mick Herron. Mick Herron is the author of the Slough House spy series of novels which have been adapted for television as Slow Horses.



The Secret Hours is a spy novel set in the present, where a government inquiry has been set up to investigate past misconduct in the British Secret Service, with long flashbacks to Berlin in 1994, the messy era of post-cold war espionage. What happened in the newly unified Berlin that someone is so keen to keep hidden in the present?

The book starts with a redundant spy being chased through Devon lanes and, unsurprisingly, this grabbed our interest but some of us then found parts of the book slow. We did enjoy the humour, dialogue and depth that Herron brings to his writing. The Secret Hours is entwined with the Slough House world, and we enjoyed trying to guess which of the characters from the 1990s would re-emerge in the Slough House novels. The author says he hadn't originally planned The Secret Hours to be a precursor to the Slough House series which we found surprising.

As with the Slough House books the characters are well developed and at least one bears a passing resemblance to a well-known government figure from the recent past. In fact, there is an element of 'state of the nation' satire in the book.

Only a few of us had finished the book by the time of our meeting, partly due to time constraints. Given the small number of us able to score the book our average score of 4 out of 5 may not be representative of the whole group.

Next month's book is The Outrun by Amy Liptrot.

Your Stars Tonight 2024 has been a hard year for this star gazer. I have enjoyed no Northern Lights and I glimpsed the much hyped Comet Tsuchinshan A3 for just 20 seconds before it disappeared behind the inevitable cloud. In fact I have managed to get out on only 15 nights this year – and frequently these were interrupted by inclement weather. My most recent effort ended after 4 hours of frustration in near freezing

temperatures with my laptop bleating to me that it was shutting down as it did not have the right software — the ghosts of Newton and Herschel mocked me from beyond the bottom of the garden. However astronomical hope springs eternal.

In the next couple of months I hope to enjoy Saturn's rings as they slowly become edge on and almost invisible before opening out again in April 2025 in their 16 year cycle of visibility. And as always I look forward to watching the eternal dance of the four Galilean moons around Jupiter and perhaps capture with a photograph their shadows as they pass in front of their parent planet. Jupiter is now easy to spot because it is so bright in the late evening, although it will be challenged in January as Venus rises higher and brighter each evening in the dusk light in the west. And around midnight Mars will be rising over the eastern horizon and maybe I might spot a white mantle of snow on its Poles.

Once the stars were thought to be eternal and unchanging. Now we know that they are as diverse, volatile and occasionally unstable as the members of the human race. The Sun, with its eleven year Sunspot Cycle (which is giving rise to this year's peak of aurora activity) is a relatively stable creature. However, many stars called Cepheid Variables change their brightness with clockwork frequency and in 1908 Henrietta Swan Leavitt deserved (but was not given) a Nobel prize for showing there was a relationship between their time period and luminosity. This work gave us a key to measuring the distance to the galaxies.

My favourites variables are the class of red stars best described as "sooty red giant stars". Their nuclear reactions produce huge clouds of carbon which smother their light until they overheat and blast the soot away. One such star is Mira, in the obscure constellation of Cetus -the Whale. Currently it is barely visible, even through binoculars, but in 9 months time this ruby red star will be easy to spot with the naked eye.

The advances in camera technology mean that I can capture all of these with my telescope and digital camera – but it is a bit techy, time consuming and all too often things go wrong. But now the smartphone revolution is bringing in yet another huge technological change. The so called "smart scopes" are lightweight, take minutes to set up on a table in the garden. Controlled from the mobile phone, they automatically work out where they are and where the stars are. So tap in "Mira" on your phone and the smart scope slews accurately to it and then not only starts taking photographs, but also digitally enhances them, giving a final image not far removed from what I am currently achieving, but in a fraction of the time. And the price tag is just a few hundred pounds – less than the cost of a modest telescope. Is this yet another example of deskilling? Like the Satnav bringing confused HGV lorry drivers down the back lanes of Ugborough? Maybe – or perhaps it opens up the wonders of the heavens to many more people. I need to ponder these thoughts before committing myself to a request to Santa.

Historical Nuggets- Gareth 'Taff' Jones

17th December 1973 – The chancellor of the Exchequer, Anthony Barber, unveiled a pre-Christmas crisis budget cutting £1,200 million from public spending. The immediate crisis was caused by striking railway workers, pay disputes by power station workers and the decision of the miners' leaders to continue with an overtime ban without balloting its members, coal supplies at the power stations were already down by 40%.

Industry and commerce were limited to five days' electricity consumption in the fortnight to the 30th December (the three-day week)! Except over Christmas and New Year, all TV services were closed down at 10.30 p.m. The mini budget was also concerned with the massive increases in oil prices by the OPEC cartel of oil trading nations. Dennis Healey, the Shadow Chancellor, advised Anthony Barber that he should tax the rich and the profits of private business (sound familiar?) rather than slash public services.

The measure was a disaster for Ted Heath who went on to lose the February 1974 election and the consequent October 1974 election. Heath was later challenged by a certain Margaret Thatcher who won the leadership contest and later became Britain's first woman Prime Minister. The three-day week restriction was eventually lifted 7th March 1974. Unfortunately for my generation the schools did stay open five days a week, Boo-Hiss!

Historical Nugget: 2nd January 1959 – The rebel Cuban leader, Fidel Castro, proclaimed a new government for Cuba. Organised opposition collapsed when Castro's troops reached Camp Columbia, the stronghold of Cuba's dictator, Fulgencio Batista. Batista was elected President of Cuba 1940-1944 and military dictator of the country from 1952 until his overthrow. During his dictatorship many political liberties were revoked, including the right to strike. He aligned himself with the wealthy landowners and oversaw an economy which stagnated and saw the gap between rich and poor widen.

Batista's government began to systematically profit from the exploitation of Cuba's commercial interests (a similar condition is happening in Russia with Putin and his henchman) by negotiating relationships with the American Mafia which controlled drugs, gambling, and prostitution in Havana. Batista fled to the Dominican Republic with a personal fortune and eventually sought sanctuary in Portugal, living in Madeira and then Estoril. He died of a heart attack in Marbella, Spain on 6th August 1973.

There is a lot of post-revolution history to Cuba and much of it is well known; America sought to overthrow Castro in the Bay of Pigs fiasco in 1961 whilst the Soviet Union supported the Cuban economy until its own collapse in 1991. Soviet support for Castro brought the world to the brink of nuclear war in Cuban Missile Crisis in October 1962.

Castro retired as dictator of Cuba 31 July 2006 passing his political duties to his brother, Raul. Castro eventually died 25 November 2016. Cuba is still a one-party state.

Wild About The Erme River (WATER) is delighted to announce that it has been granted charity status by the Charity Commission. Formed last year in May 2023, the organisation is a collaborative, positive action group working to restore water quality and habitat across the catchment of the Erme for the benefit of nature and people. WATER's approach is to consider the total catchment of the Erme from its source on Dartmoor to the many tributaries that feed it, as one inter-dependent habitat. What happens in one part of the river can have impacts further downstream and out into the estuary, the beaches and the coast.

That is why the charity's action projects are organised into land-based and water-based activities. There is a diverse range of landscapes across the catchment, some managed by farming landowners and others by non-farming owners. Whether it is wetland restoration or creation, run-off diversion away from water courses or creating wildlife corridors by planting trees to connect otherwise isolated riverside habitats, all actions are driven by a desire to find sustainable, affordable, nature-based solutions.

Local authorities, and particularly the local communities, are a vital means of restoring and monitoring river health and habitats across the catchment.

While embracing natural solutions, WATER's approach is driven by science. In partnership with the Westcountry Rivers Trust, local communities and environmental groups across the catchment have volunteers operating regular water testing, as part of a region-wide Citizen Science project. The results of each test are uploaded to a central data bank to enable score cards to be kept for the river.

(Graham and David have written about their water testing and monitoring results in previous Newsletters.)

Ugborough Parish Council News from our November Meeting. One member of the public attended our November Meeting

Matters raised by the Public and Arising from Previous Meetings

- 1. Greener Ugborough thanked us for achieving 20mph status in the village. We are so pleased that this had finally been completed and thank everyone who has contributed to the consultations that were a vital part of the process.
- 2. Although a member of the public has commented that they are pleased to see attempts are being made to deal with the dog barking situation in the village, we are sorry to hear that it is still a problem. Cllr Alison Dewynter has spent a significant amount of time pursuing this matter for which we thank her. There is a specific process that must be followed by a complainant (including keeping a 14-day record and making recordings) in order for any legal action to be taken. This has been communicated to individuals who now need to decide if they wish to take action.
- 3. There is finally progress with the repair of the light on the Conduit. The electrician has identified where the problem is, and permission has been granted from SHDC to undertake the work. We are now looking for a maintenance person to work alongside the lighting engineer.
- 4. The Post Office have agreed to move the post box in Ugborough Square to the kerb of the platform area so that people in wheelchairs and on mobile scooters can use it from the road. We look forward to this work being done in the near future
- 5. We understand the concern about the hedge slippage on Fore St and have contacted the landowner and asked if they would repair the damage. There has been no reply to date. Devon County Council will clear a road when it is blocked but cannot undertake work on someone else's property
- 7. Community Speedwatch in Bittaford 1 session has taken place in Wrangaton. During the 90 minutes 214 vehicles passed with 10 going faster than 35mph in the 30mph speed restriction. Theses 10 drivers will receive a first warning letter from the police.

We will be agreeing our budget for 2025-2026 at our December meeting and so, if your organisation is thinking about applying for a grant from us next year, now is the time to do so.





Rainfall at Shellwood Hill George Arnison

According to my 15-year record, October is on average the second wettest month of the year (after December). We haven't got to December yet, but already October has been only the third wettest month of 2024 - after February and March - which might suggest it was drier than normal. It wasn't. February and March were both exceptionally wet months this year, and in October I recorded 210mm (about 8 ¼") of rain at Shellwood Hill, which was well above the month's 171mm average. But we have had wetter Octobers, which is something I suppose. The season's first named storm - Storm Ashley - blew through with winds up to 80mph reported, but it affected the North much more than the South. Over in the Gulf of Mexico, a Category 5 hurricane - Hurricane Milton - devastated parts of Florida. It was the second mostintense hurricane ever recorded in that part of the world, and the strongest tropical cyclone anywhere in 2024, with winds up to 180mph - which is very hard to imagine.
