G-UP - Creating a community where it's easy to live sustainably

G-UP face to face meetings are (finally!) back.

Join us this month for our first full in person meeting in what feels like a VERY long time!

Wednesday 19th Oct — Ugborough Village Hall 8 p.m. <u>All welcome</u>. Free to attend, with donations to G-UP welcome.

We'll be taking a close look at **thermal imaging cameras**, hand held devices which identify heat loss from buildings (cold spots) allowing us to better understand where/how we can insulate our homes more effectively. Our guest speaker is Henry Wainwright from Bigbury Net Zero who will be taking us through a hands-on demo of the equipment, which — with the help of a willing volunteer - we will then be able to use here in Ugborough Parish.

This year has seen unprecedented energy price rises. The full effect of which will be felt in the coming winter months as we turn on our heating. Clearly, we can turn the heating *down* to save money, but this is not always an option, especially for the young and old. To make more efficient use of the heating we put into our homes, the use of thermographic cameras help identify where heat loss is occurring in a building. Practical ideas for how to reduce each building's heat loss can then be more effectively applied. Of course, heat loss prevention also has the benefit of reducing our carbon footprint.

Funded by SHDC, this initiative is applicable to local business premises and public buildings as well as homes so please spread the word.

We'll also make a little time for a brief general update on other G-UP initiatives so come along to hear what's happening.

As detailed in last month's Newsletter, Devon Rural Skills Trust (DRST) will hold its annual hedgelaying competition this year at Hillhead Farm, Ugborough by kind permission of David and Jane Johns. It will take place on Saturday 1st October. There will be three classes in the event. Competitors in the Open Class will lay 10 yards, Intermediates/Veterans (Over 60) will lay 8 yards and Novices will lay 6 yards. Cups and prizes will be awarded to the winners in each class and there will be a cup for the best lady competitor. The Jack Connabeer Memorial Cup will be presented to the best placed DRST non-prize winner. There is also a cup for the best regrowth on the previous competition hedge, which was held at Cutwellwalls near Avonwick in October 2019. The event has taken place since 1992 but due to Covid restrictions the competition did not take place in 2020 or 2021.

Briefing of competitors and drawing of lengths will take place at 9.15 a.m. and work will start at 9.30 and cease at 2.30 p.m.

<u>Beryl's Bookworms</u> – Sue Johns The Thursday Murder Club.:

Well – this book caused a schism in our usual tranquil deliberations!

Written by Richard Osman, the well-known TV celebrity both on and off screen, it caused a 10-way bidding war of publishers to secure the book deal as word got out that it was being written which usually puts our Group on the defensive before we start! It went on to become the fastest selling adult crime debut since records began.

We all managed to valiantly put that behind us and read this amiable if undemanding cosy caper, drawing on Osman's passion for English crime fiction. It is set in an affluent retirement village, where the 'Waitrose delivery vans clink with wine and repeat prescriptions,' and centres on four unlikely characters coming together attempting to investigate unsolved cold murder cases on a Thursday. They are delighted when a couple of real-life murders throw them into full investigative role, and by fair means or foul 'assist' the local police to bring the perpetrators to justice.

Several of the Group found most of the joy of this book in the character portrayal, with the murders of secondary importance. As many of the group are definitely within 'that' age bracket, some felt that we could identify characters we know personally who, after a lifetime of honing, are never going to change now – which some of us think is just **fascinating.**

Many of us found the comments of Joyce (one of the characters) hilarious: 'I keep secrets to myself, right up to the time someone asks me about them,' whose daughter 'didn't use to be allergic to dogs, but people seem to get allergic to things when she moved to London!'

However, others in the Group found the whole book superficial, the characters too many and simply annoying -the police made to look bungling and the murder mystery confusing and ridiculous.

There were moments of pathos in the book, which some felt added to the reality and charm of aging (?), whilst others just found it rather depressing.

The average score was consequently 3 out of 5





Rainfall at Shellwood Hill George Arnison

The dry year continued through August, when we had our second (or was it a third?) official heatwave of the year, and a formal drought was declared across much of England, including Devon. It of course then almost immediately started to rain, but only a bit. At Shellwood Hill I recorded $37mm (1\frac{1}{2})$ of rain which was less than a third of the monthly average of 123mm. It is a mark of the lack of rain during 2022 however that it was still only the third driest month this year - both April and July were dryer.

It has been an exceptionally warm and dry summer overall, with a total rainfall over the three months of just 103mm – compared to the average since 2010 of 302mm. Across mainland Europe it has been much worse however...with very serious heatwaves, wildfires and apparently the worse drought for 500 years!

Your Stars Tonight. The steamed dietor often remarks on my calm demeanour and fortitude in the face of adversity, and how my unwavering cheerfulness and good humour allows me to rise above the trials and tribulations of life (except on Mondays). I put this down to years of star gazing with its blighted hopes and disappointments usually as a result of weather, invasive buildings and trees, or

(mostly), the inability to get out into the cold and dark.

The planets Jupiter, Saturn and Uranus are all visible at the moment, with an angry, orange red Mars joining them around midnight. Uranus is only just visible to the eye in exceeding dark skies (think middle of Dartmoor or Exmoor) but easily spotted with binoculars, while with a telescope it is magnified to a pale green disc. My most recent "not to be missed astronomical event" was 14th September, when the planet Uranus was occulted by the Moon and the challenge was to see it blink out of sight as the dark side of the Moon passed in front of it. And then, rather trickier, to spot Uranus reappear from behind the lit side of the Moon about fifty minutes later. Just before the occultation I confidently headed down the garden, binoculars at the ready, only to be flummoxed by a lack of moon - it was only just rising low over the horizon and was completely hidden by the vicarage. If I had bothered to look it up on any of a dozen websites I would have known this and gone to the top of the hill on the Ridgeway for a good view. A little crestfallen I went in doors for a metaphorical fag (of a nicotine rather than a Rees Mogg variety) and came out an hour later hoping to catch Uranus as it reappeared from behind the other side of the moon. The moon was now high in the sky, but a thin cloud provocatively floated in front of it. No doubt the pair of them thought they made a very attractive sight, ghostly vapours and all that, but the viewing of a faint planet was not assisted by the hazy glare of the moon. After another thirty minutes of watching the clouds thicken, I retired into the warm for a metaphorical cup of Ovaltine and reflected that the reality of astronomy falls far short of my plans and dreams.

Over the years I loved watching satellites crossing the night sky. Not so much the flashy International Space Station, although I always used to wave just in case an astronaut happened to be looking down at Ugborough. I preferred to just sit and watch for the faint ones that pop into view above the horizon and then silently glide across the heaven brightening and then getting fainter as they pass into the Earth's shadow. However they are increasingly becoming a nuisance to astrophotographers as the satellite trails show as harsh white lines that ruin the picture, and I have noticed how much worse it's all become since the Musk/ Bezos gang launched their recent flurry of communication satellites.

Now there is the launch of the Blue Walker 3 communication satellite with its 64 square metre reflective surface that makes it the brightest object in the sky apart from the Moon. The Texas based corporation AST Spacemobile aims to launch 100 more of these in 2023 and they will directly beam 4G and 5G to mobile phones. Yet again the Human Race demonstrates an insatiable desire to trash its world and now invade outer space. So in 2024 we can look forward to fast downloads everywhere on the planet: award winning Netflix documentaries entitled "The last day of the Amazonian Jaguar", "Madagascar Monkey memories", "Goodbye to the butterflies" and perhaps even a locally made "Farewell to the Ludbrook Damselfly" along with a big screen digital recreation of "Old Time starry nights remembered" - all direct to your device.

Matters raised by members of the public at our last meeting

It was noted that the bus shelter to be provided at Wrangaton as part of the new development agreement was still not installed. Cllr Holway will pursue this.

There had been damage to the porch of a property on Ware Hill caused by a speeding vehicle – Cllr Fletcher will bring this to the attention of DCC Cllr Thomas

An additional dog poo bin has been requested by a resident of Lucerne Fields on Footpath 16- JF to send details to ClIr Abbott who has a spare bin that can be moved there.

Availability of seating on the school bus was raised – this person was referred to the DCC website

Devon County Council News

Finance - An overall overspend is estimated at £35.6 million, £18.6 million in savings and income are being proposed by officers who have joined forces from all Council services to identify ways to safeguard County finances. Therefore a £17 million overspend is currently predicted for this financial year ending March 2023.

Avian Flu - There are some cases of bird flu currently in Devon, and the government's Animal and Plant Health Agency (APHA) requested that a protection zone be set up around outbreak areas so that people living in or visiting the area can take extra care to help reduce the risk of it spreading. A map of the Avian Influenza Prevention Zone is available on the government's website. The risk to public health from the virus is very low and the Food Standards Agency advice remains unchanged, that avian influenzas pose a very low food safety risk for UK consumers. Properly cooked poultry and poultry products, including eggs, are safe to eat.

South Hams District Council News

- 3 Ukraine support officers have been appointed and further information from government on the future operation of the assistance schemes is expected.
- The Waste collection service will be brought in house in October but there could still be difficulties recruiting sufficient drivers and loaders.
- The out turn for 2021/22 was just over £200,000 lower expenditure than expected on a budget of over £9 million.
- Sustrans have been given the go ahead to do the feasibility study for the lyybridge to Bittaford Cycleway following the grant funding from SHDC.

Cllr Holway has offered to help clear any unemptied brown bins parishioners were unable to deal with themselves

Planning Council considered 8 planning applications and noted 3 decisions made by South Hams District Council. For further details see the minutes to the September meeting.

Dartmoor National Park has announced that the new planning application IT handling system changeover is scheduled from 13 - 30 September. For further details go to their website

Grant funding We are very pleased to be grant funding the excellent village website £170.00 We are also pleased to have received £415 from Devon County Council towards the work of our Lengthsman.

Correspondence Council considered and agreed to the proposal from Bloor Homes for Street naming Phase 2 Filham after regional birds: Siskin, Greenfinch, Linnet, Goosander, Pochard, Gadwall and Pintail

The Dartmoor National Park Authority are consulting on the A38 Corridor Access to the Moor. Council agrees that additional access to the Moor is needed in the light of the new development to the East of Ivybridge. If you would like to have your say, go to their Consultation map tool.

Bittaford Play Park Council were sad to hear that the recent heavy rain had damaged the new path through the park and are liaising with DNP to make it good again. The repairs to the seesaw are in hand so watch this space We will also be partnering with DNP to improve accessibility to the park providing an accessible picnic bench when DNP install a new gateway next year.

School and Pre-School The Council continues to pursue a suitable agreement with Westcountry Schools Trust for use of the School field.

Council fully supports the efforts to build a new pre-school building but agreed that the Burial Ground would be an unsuitable location for the pre-school based on previous objections from the community to use of the ground in the past. The new proposals for possible locations — Anchor Inn barn area in the car park and Workhouse Field were considered and it was agreed that there were no strong feelings against either location but that The Anchor Inn was preferred. The next Meeting will be held in the Committee Room at Ugborough Village Hall from 7.30 p.m. on Wednesday 5th October. You are welcome to join the meeting and ask questions about local issues.

Each year Ugborough and its surrounding area have supported this Appeal on behalf of St Peters Church, and it is going ahead again this year. These are challenging times and there are many calls on our support in this country and around the world, but if you want to do a Shoebox or contribute to part of a Shoebox it would be most welcome.

Leaflets and posters for this year's appeal will be available in St Peter's Church and the bus shelter during October 2022 for anyone interested, to help themselves to.

This year there are three ways to take part:-

- 1) Online Fill A Shoebox or Send A Prepacked Shoebox On the Samaritan's Purse website it is possible to purchase either of these two options for £20 which includes the £5 project cost/delivery donation. The link is Samaritan's Purse/Operation Christmas Child/Ways To Give/Pack A Shoebox Online OPTION 1 Pack Your Shoebox Online OR OPTION 2 Send A Pre-Packed Shoebox_- if you use either of these options it would be helpful if you could let me know so we can have an idea of how many Shoeboxes might have been sent. If you don't have access to the internet or would like me to deal with this option on your behalf let me know and I can provide you with information regarding what can be ordered for your shoebox. Contact me on 07549854461.
- 2) Fill A Shoebox -If you choose to do a Shoebox, it can be filled and <u>returned by the end of October 2022</u> to the Church or me at Hill House, Ugborough (opposite Village Hall) and I will deliver it to the local drop off point early November. Please <u>do not</u> leave it in the bus shelter nor the Village Hall. A shoebox can be for a boy or girl for age groups 2 to 4, 5 to 9 and/or 10 to 14 years old. Items to be provided can include new toys/accessories, school supplies, personal care items etc more detail is provided in the leaflets. There is also opportunity to donate towards the suggested £5 project cost donation required for each box including shipping. There are some items which cannot be sent, and they are noted in the leaflets e.g. sweets, toothpaste etc.
- 3) Monetary Donations In Sealed/Unsealed Envelopes using the envelope attached to the leaflet please put through my letterbox at Hill House (opposite the Village Hall). I will either deliver it to the local drop off point with the packed physical Shoeboxes or create online Shoeboxes on your behalf as appropriate. Please do not leave it in the bus shelter nor at the Church nor the Village Hall.

In 2016 32 Gift Shoeboxes went to Belarus, in 2017 42 went to Albania, in 2018 48 went to Bulgaria, in 2019 30 went to Belarus, Central Asia and Serbia, in 2020 31 went to Georgia, Serbia and Nigeria and in 2022 28 went to Central Asia.

Whilst we won't know which country(ies) the Shoeboxes/monetary donations will go to before they start their journey, where Gift Shoeboxes are registered online, they will be tracked so we can be informed which country(ies) they go to after they are delivered.
