#### Printmaking workshops

Local artist Sara Gilbert works from her cosy loft studio tucked away behind Ermington Mill, where she is offering printmaking workshops. Students can choose from linocut, collagraph, drypoint etching, fabric printing or paper lithography – or a combination of all of the above! Suitable for beginners or those wishing to brush-up on their skills, workshop space is limited to two people sharing. Students get tailored tuition and time to learn how to design, make and ink-up their printing plates, colour mixing and the hand-printing process. So, come along and have a go and make use of Sara's Hawthorn etching press and well-equipped studio. It costs £35 per person for half a day (3 hours) and £70 for all day (6 hours). Block bookings of four sessions or more attract a 10% discount (two people sharing). All materials and light refreshments are included.

Sara is also running a beginners' linocut day on Saturday  $8^{th}$  March from 10 a.m.-4 p.m.- cost £70.

Our HAPPY LOO YEAR event in January saw 40 people attend with lots of support to move forward with the purchase and development of the long-closed public toilets at both Ugborough and Bittaford. At this event more local volunteers stepped forward which means we now have a fundraising team in place. This group have met, and with thanks to Chloe, have undertaken some training she has offered in this area. Funding applications are underway! A key part of applications is to demonstrate to funders the community benefits of this project. We want to see each building reopened primarily as a public loo - each fully renovated, made accessible and with a baby change.

Additionally to this, there is a small part of each building that could be used for alternative community use as well. Please have a think about what you would like to see housed within these structures for community benefit. The newly formed *Community Engagement* arm of our group is developing a survey (and may well ask you in person) – please share your views, tell us what you think and of course if you have any time to give (even a little!) please get involved.

#### Historical Nugget- Gareth 'Taff' Jones

23<sup>rd</sup> /24<sup>th</sup> March 1989 – Alaska, on this day the super tanker, *Exxon Valdez*, ran aground in Prince William Sound shortly after leaving the port of Valdez, the terminus of the Alaskan oil pipeline. At 987 feet long and weighing nearly 215,000 tons, the *Exxon Valdez* was carrying over 53 million US gallons of crude oil and shortly after the pilot disembarked the third mate altered course to avoid small icebergs in the Sound. Another change in course near midnight resulted in the ship running aground on the Bligh Reef and 11 million US gallons of crude spilled into the Sound.

The immediate effect was the deaths of between 100,000 and 250,000 seabirds, as many as 2,800 sea otters, approximately 300 harbour seals, over 200 bald eagles, and 20 odd orcas. The number of salmon, herring and other fish is not known. A clean operation ensued taking many months, this operation was also the subject of investigation and intense media interest focussing on the apparent toxicity of the chemicals used in the clean-up operation.

The Master, Joseph Hazelwood and the two Mates were ordered to be available to face Federal charges. It was alleged in the media that the Master had been drunk although 21 witnesses testified that he did not appear to be under the influence of alcohol. As is usually the case, the accident was not a simple matter of X, Y or Z happening but a catalogue of errors involving not only the Exxon company, but the US Coast Guard and the Alaskan authorities. Much litigation ensued amongst all the parties involved; Exxon were fined \$5 billion in punitive damages, on appeal reduced to \$2.5 billion. The Supreme Court reduced this further to \$500 million to cover the costs of the clean-up operation. After returning to service and operating under numerous owners using different names, the *Exxon Valdez* eventually sold for scrap and, the irony of it, was beached on the Gujarat Coast in India and dismantled in 2012.

#### Beryl's Bookworms - Juliet Collis

It was with mixed emotions that we met up in February, as we had recently heard that Beryl (as in Beryl's Bookworms) had sadly died in January. We reminisced about the books that Beryl liked (and disliked!) and the fun that we have had as a book group since we started in 1999. It

was Beryl who had expressed an interest in starting a book group when we held the Ugborough Village Appraisal, just before the Millenium and who ended up setting up the group. The Bookworms had a toast to Beryl who we thought would have been thrilled to know that her book club legacy continues to thrive after 25 years.

Our February book was a debut murder mystery novel by (Judge) Robert Rinder. The victim was a 'public hero' police officer who had collapsed and died at the Old Bailey, minutes before giving testimony in a drugs case. All evidence pointed to the victim having been poisoned and the prime suspect being a recently released career felon, who had a 'history' with the policeman.

The main protagonist, Adam Green, was a pupil barrister on the accused's defence team. He was a likeable character, and we got an insight into the workings of chambers and the early careers of barristers. Rob Rinder had a number of similarities to Adam Green, as are both Jewish, with single mothers, from working-class backgrounds, navigating an Oxbridge-dominated profession. Rob Rinder has specialised in fraud, as well as other cases including British soldiers charged with the manslaughter of Iraqi detainees.

Rob Rinder has also appeared on a number of TV shows, starting with Judge Rinder in 2014, Strictly in 2016, 'The Holy Land and Us', 'My Family the Holocaust and Me' and more recently, 'Britain Behind Bars'. An episode of 'Who Do You Think You Are' traced his Jewish family's tragic history and made new discoveries about his grandfather, a survivor of both <u>Schlieben</u> and <u>Theresienstadt</u> concentration camps. Rinder states that being the grandson of a "Holocaust survivor has informed my politics, my view of the world, my instinctive reaction to people, this idea of who in the community is a bystander, a rescuer, a perpetrator."


There were mixed reactions in the group to the book, although generally we thought that it was easy to read, with characters who we could relate to, and it gave a good insight into the world of pupil barristers and their interactions with other members of their chambers.


Overall we scored it 3.8

#### Rainfall at Shellwood Hill George Arnison

Apparently, January 2025 was (somewhat unexpectedly) the warmest January ever - globally. Not in South Devon! For us it was cold. It started off wet and cold; was then just cold for a week; and ended by being windy, wet and cold as Storms Eowyn and Herminia blew through. At Shellwood Hill I recorded 245mm (just over 9 1/2") of rainfall, which was well above the months 174mm average.

#### Ugborough Parish Council News from our February Meeting.

#### Two members of the public attended the meeting

#### Dementia Friendly Ugborough.

Claire Puckey (Community Liaison and Support Lead for the Four Rivers Dementia Alliance) gave a brief introduction into the work of the Alliance and the support available to parish councils.

She will be sending us further information (which will be available on our website) and at the March meeting we will agree what actions we can take to make Ugborough a Dementia-friendly Parish. If you have any suggestions, please email our clerk or come along to our next meeting.

#### Matters raised by the Public and Arising from Previous Meetings

- 1. Wheelchair access to the post box in Ugborough Square Unfortunately, following their review of the site, Royal Mail have concerns over health and safety if the post box was repositioned nearer to the road. The post box cannot face the road as it will force users and Royal Mail staff to stand in the road to access the post box. Furthermore, the post box could be blocked off by a parked vehicle. We have decided to fund the work ourselves to create 2 drop kerbs at the corner of the raised island and are currently seeking quotes.
- 2. A replacement tree in Ugborough Square will be planted this spring
- 3. It was noted that the **Parish Magazine** was in need of funding, and it was agreed that this would be considered on receipt of a grant funding application from the organisation
- 4. Flooding outside the school we were very sorry to hear of the flooding and subsequent ice that caused a traffic accident outside the school. We will report a blocked drain at the entrance to the school field to DCC and ask our lengthsman to clear the buddle holes on the hills up to Toby Cross and Hillhead Farm. Hopefully this will prevent another incident.

**Report from County Councillor** Cllr Dan Thomas had sent apologies and an update on the Government's recent white paper on Devolution and potential impact on Devon.

**Report from District Councillors** Cllr Alison Dewynter had sent apologies. Cllr Abbott spoke briefly on SHDC revised parking charges in Ivybridge and reminded us that it is time to subscribe to the **garden waste service** if required. We are very conscious that there is a significant price increase for the garden waste collection and have expressed our concerns regarding that to Cllr Abbott. Their report is available on our website.

A summary of topics covered follows:

Garden waste services, Bird Flu, Half-term activities at Fusion Leisure Centres, SHDC's response to the Local Government Finance Settlement

**Councillor News** We are very sad that Joan Fletcher has stood down from Council and will miss her commitment and dedication very much. Councillor Tim Slater (as deputy Chair) has agreed to step into the role of Chair and Councillor Jon May will take on the role of Vice-Chair.

**Planning** Aldi had submitted a revised application for the proposed store in lvybridge. We consider that our previous concerns regarding adequate screening on the west of the site had not been fully addressed and so have re-submitted our previous response. We supported the erection of two solar fences on land at Sx 690 567, Ugborough but felt that we had insufficient information to make an informed decision on the application to change existing enclosed paddock into a riding school with sand on land at Sx 665 563. Bittaford and have requested further details.

We had received ten notification of decisions made by South Hams District Council and Dartmoor National Park Authority and these are listed on our website.

**Finance** At our December meeting we agreed our budget for 2025-2026 and a precept of £42,000. The 2025/26 Council Tax bill for a Band D property will be £35.14 for the Ugborough council tax element of the total bill. This is an increase of £2.02 on the 2024/25 Band D figure of £33.12.

The agreed budget is available on our website. We are pleased to grant £200 towards the website hosting costs for Ugborough.com. Our burial fees have been revised to show a 5% increase for 25-26 - these will take effect from  $1^{st}$  April 2025. Fees for people outside of the parish are doubled.

**Highways and Public Footpaths** We have been approached by South Hams Ramblers with a request to use their signposting for the newly developed South Hams Way in the parish. We are very happy to support this initiative.

Work is currently being done on the annual review of all our footpaths as part of our agreement with South Hams District Council and to know where to focus the limited funding we receive next year. If anyone has any comments to make, please email our clerk.

On an appropriately very wet day in January ClIrs Fletcher and Hart met with the Devon County Council Flood Officer in Ugborough Village. At the site meeting it was agreed that DCC would review the water-flow throughout - looking at works done and the impact of any development. They would also research possible grant funding sources for any future agreed work. We will report further on this when we hear from them again.

Asset Management and Maintenance Work The latest monthly inspection of Bittaford Play Area only identified a couple of small works that need doing and this is very gratifying having invested so much time and money last year to maintenance issues.

Unfortunately, the weather took its toll on part of the **hedge to our burial ground**, and we will be seeking quotes for repair work to this as soon as possible. Work on the **repainting of the conduit** will begin as soon as the weather improves. We have been in communication with DCC for almost two years now regarding the installation of a bus shelter at the entrance to the Bloor Estate on the B3213 Filham. We have now approached them with a proposal to part fund the installation of a bus shelter. The estimated costs for us are up to £8,000 but with no on-going maintenance costs.

**Transport survey** We have recently contributed towards the costs for South Hams Community Action to survey local people on transport needs within their parish. The findings will enable local councils and voluntary organisations to have a clearer picture of your transport needs, and we would be very grateful if you could spend a few minutes completing this survey. It is available on our website, or you can go online and respond. Printed versions are in The Ship Inn, St Peter's Church, The Village Hall and The Horse and Groom Pub, Bittaford.
