Many thanks to everyone that attended the meeting we hosted to discuss the former public

toilets in Ugborough and Bittaford. A strong interest in the community taking on these former public conveniences in some way was evident: Many are keen to have at least one accessible toilet up and running again at each, whilst a variety of other multipurpose uses were also touched on, along with considerations and feasibility surrounding these 'starting point' ideas.

Legislation states that to be eligible to formally express a 'community right to bid' on these assets with SHDC, you must be an *incorporated* group. At our meeting, attendees thereby decided that a new Community Interest Company (CIC) would be set up specifically for this purpose. Four people volunteered as initial Directors; and five as Advisory Board members to proceed. Special thanks to Vici Hemming and Chloe Tingle who (within the space of 48 hours!) had composed and submitted the CIC application for the newly formed *Ugborough Parish At Your Convenience CIC* (and are still in the throes of ironing this out).

We now wait for this to be processed, after which we hope to write to SHDC to formally express interest in these buildings. This early-stage process is not an application nor bid: This simply informs SHDC that there's community interest and - if accepted - triggers a 6-month period within which the community can come together, consult, determine feasibility and put in place legal structures for anything they might like to do with the buildings before then submitting a business plan or proposal.

These buildings are 'Assets of Community Value'... If you are interested in how they should best be used by the community and the future of these buildings, please get in touch or come along to our next meeting. Similarly, if you have skills in relation to this process that you think you could lend, we would love to hear from you.

Your Stars Tonight I was enjoying a June sun drenched evening sitting on the seat at the top of the hill at Hookmoor Cross – always a welcome resting spot when taking a walk around Ugborough village. I had taken my secateurs to do some pruning of the spring growth which tends to invade the area around and under the bench but was

delighted to find someone else had already done the job which meant all I had to do was sit and watch the world go by. What could be nicer? Warm and dry, with the sun soothing away the long winter blues and a post Covid 2024 fatigue. Add to that, the promise of clear skies and starry night skies – albeit short and late.

I have been chasing comets. They are, as always, unpredictable and wayward in their behaviour and in the next few months there promises to be quite a few interesting ones. I wonder what the collective noun for comets is. They are rather like feral cats who are apparently called a "clowder" or a " clutter" of cats. So, let's just say that there is a clowder of faint comets wandering around the night sky at the moment some of whom may break big. The most promising is Comet 2023 A3 (Tsuchinshan-ATLAS) currently scraping the Western horizon just after sunset and just visible with binoculars and already showing a small tail. In July it goes below the horizon - perhaps to show off in the southern hemisphere as it brightens on its approach to the sun - before reappearing in October in the evening sky when it might be easily visible to the naked eye. But predicting what a 40 km pile of rocks glued together with frozen water and gas is going to do as it is heated up by the sun is always tricky – it may end up being yet another fuzzy dot.

I also took the opportunity of a clear night to explore the obscure constellation of Canes Venatici (the hunting dogs) – a faint scatter of stars between the brighter constellations of the Herdsman (Boötes) and the Great Bear (Ursa Major) – perhaps the herdsman's dogs are snapping at the bear's heels in heavenly mythology. The brightest star is named Cor Caroli in honour of Charles II and there at least 5 large galaxies visible with binoculars. I have long wanted to photograph NGC 4163, also known as the Whale Galaxy (it does look a little like one) and its fainter companion NGC 4657. They are around 35 million light years away and at some time in the very distant past they collided with each other leaving NGC 4657 looking as if it had had a minor rear end shunt.

Our own galaxy is predicted to collide with the Andromeda galaxy which is our nearest galactic neighbour in around three billion years' time. Should one take out insurance? The average distance between stars is around 5 light years – that's about 30,000,000,000,000 earth miles – so most of the contents of the two galaxies - stars, planets, comets, nebula, interstellar dust clouds and assorted black holes - should just pass through each other like ships in the nights.

But back to July 2024 - the planets are beginning to return to the night sky. If you are an early morning bird then Jupiter, Saturn ,Mars and a faint Neptune are visible before sunrise. I prefer to wait for the twilight after which gives the chance of glimpsing Venus and Mercury just above the horizon in the Northwest. And a possible treat may be seen 30 minutes after sunset on 6<sup>th</sup> July when both planets are just below the faintest of faint crescent of a New Moon – possibly a great photo from the top of Ugborough Beacon.

## Historical Nugget- Gareth 'Taff' Jones

**Historical Nugget: 25<sup>th</sup> July 1909** – Dover Castle. The Frenchman, Louis Bleriot, became the first man to fly the English Channel. Bleriot landed at Dover Castle forty-three minutes after taking off at 05:00 from Sangatte near Calais, and with it won the £1000 prize offered by the *Daily Mail*. Bleriot covered the thirty-one miles distance at 40 MPH in a monoplane fitted with a three-cylinder engine. This was achieved just over five and a half years after the Wright brothers flew 850 feet in the first powered flight at Kittyhawk, 17<sup>th</sup> December 1903.

In the words of one historian; 'It took him twenty-five minutes to cross the ditch that had insulated Britain from the Continent for millennia...' Britain's security of invasion from the continent was no longer assured.

**Historical Nugget: 6**<sup>th</sup> **August 1972** – Kampala. The Ugandan dictator, General Idi Amin Dada, declared that 50,000 Asian passport holders were to be expelled to Britain within three months. Amin accused the Asians of sabotaging the economy, they had settled in Uganda and elsewhere in East Africa for over a hundred years and were the most prosperous community in Uganda. Indeed, once they came and settled in Britain, their business enterprise and commitment for hard work benefitted the country in many ways. Most of us of a certain age can remember corner shops keeping regular opening hours of 09:00-17:00, closing for lunch and for half a day mid-week, they generally opened Saturday mornings only. It was quite a surprise when some shops were bought up by the Ugandan Asians that opened earlier and shut much later, with all day opening on a Saturday.

In response to Amin's announcement, a Home Office official expressed surprise; 'We always thought that Amin was a decent chap. After all, he served in the British Army for more than 15 years. Yup! That sounds just like a Whitehall bureaucrat. (Amin served from 1946 in the King's African Rifles rising to the rank of Lieutenant)

## Questions from the Public and Matters Arising from Previous Meetings

A Trustee for PL:21 reported back briefly on their response to the Aldi consultation and Cllr Fletcher confirmed that we had raised several issues with Aldi at the meeting

we had with them and were now awaiting the application before any further comment.

We will make sure that Donkey Lane is trimmed back in time for Fair Week, and we are happy for a sandpit to be placed on the Church Green

We continue to chase the repair of the Light on the Conduit and are pleased that the Church Yard grass has now been cut. We are conscious that many graves are hidden in the longer undergrowth, and we will ask if a copy of the map of the gravestones can be made more accessible and put on the Council website

**Devon County Councillor Dan Thomas** had sent his apologies and provided the following information:

• James McInnes is now the leader of Devon County Council and Andrea Davis is deputy leader.

• John Hart is Chairman of the Council for what will be his final year as a county councillor.

• Combined County Authority - this was not dealt with as part of the windingup business of Parliament and so it has been postponed until the next Government is elected.

**Planning** We considered 5 planning applications:

1685/24/FUL  $\,$  and 1846/24/FUL Windy Ridge, Ugborough. Erection of roof over existing store -

Support for both applications (Cllr Cooper declared an interest and left the room for this agenda item.)

1537/24/HHO 2 Park Cottages Ugborough. Application for small single storey extension at the front of the building - Support

1704/24/FUL Combe Cross Farm Ivybridge. Erection of covered handling yard and general-purpose agricultural building - Support

1724/24/VPO Proposed Development At Sx 6481 5631 Ivybridge to modify a Section 106 Agreement for application 57/2472/14/O to accommodate upcoming development proposals at the site - Support subject to the development of the site being for employment use

We had received 8 decisions made by SHDC and DNP since the last meeting and these can be seen on our website.

**Finance** We were very pleased to grant £170 to the Bittaford Planters for their work to spruce up the area under the viaduct – massive thankyou to them and Ugborough planters for their work

**Highways** We continue to negotiate with Devon Highways regarding what can be done about the speeding on the approach to Ivybridge from Bittaford (B3213), David's

Cross. The 30mph sign cannot be moved and so our next conversation is to see if the national speed limit sign close to this can be removed and / or a "you are approaching a 30mph zone" sign added. Watch this space!

The official Devon County Council 20mph zone in Ugborough village consultation was finally published on 20<sup>th</sup> June with a closing date of 11<sup>th</sup> July. If you wish to make any comments, please go to their consultation website: https://devon.cc/20mph. Further details can also be seen on our website.

**Public Footpaths** – Cllrs Hart and May have now walked all the paths and checked for accessibility and maintenance issues. A barbed wire fence that had been erected across one of the paths has now been removed. Please do let us now if you come across any problems when you are out and about.

**Climate Emergency and sustainable Ugborough** The Balsam Bashing group have now had 2 meets and 2 more are scheduled on 30th June and 21st July – see our website for further details and please contact the clerk if you would like to get involved.

## Our Assets and maintenance work

**Bittaford Play Area** If you have visited the park recently, you will be aware that the improved weather has finally allowed us to start work in earnest on various jobs identified in the monthly and annual inspections. Please be patient with us and, if there is equipment or areas taped off, please do not remove this as it is there for safety reasons. We will be making good the area where the old shelter climbing frame was with a view to installing new toddler equipment when finances allow, and the see-saw is awaiting repair or replacement. There will also be work, in due course, to reduce the likelihood of the flooding that caused so much damage to the path at the end of last year.

**Post Office and Post Box** We have considered ways to improve accessibility to the Post Office and post box in Ugborough Square and we will be arranging for tiles to be fitted to improve the path and alleviate the gradient problem to the Church and talking to Devon County Highways regarding solutions for the post box.

**Former Public Toilets in Ugborough & Bittaford** South Hams District Council have published their notice of intention to sell and, as we applied in the past for these buildings to be made community assets, there is a special process that needs to be followed to ensure that community groups have a right to bid before they go on the open market. We had agreed in the past that it would be unsustainable for us to open up the buildings and run as public toilets under the conditions placed by SHDC at that stage, but we revisited the matter due to the change in the situation. We discussed 3 options:

a) Whether to submit an expression of interest to bid for the WCs in the light of a possible revision of the terms on which sale may be offered by South Hams District Council.

b) Whether to submit an expression of interest to bid for the WCs to enable the Parish to consider the possibility of a joint venture with a Community Interest Company or other organisation with a view to reopening the WC facilities in Ugborough and Bittaford. c) Whether to earmark some of the climate change reserve to support a project taken forward by a community group subject to there being sufficient public support and a satisfactory business plan for any proposed initiative.

We had a long debate summarised as follows:

- No decision has been made on the preferred option for the facilities if purchased – favour seems to be for a joint use building with a public toilet and community space.

- Discussion regarding whether by expressing an interest the Council would be committing itself to further action and that community groups might consider the Council were going to progress a project and therefore lose focus on their own projects

- It had already been agreed by Council that it would be unsustainable for the parish council to open up the buildings and run as public toilets.

- Concern expressed that the council did not have the finances or capacity to take on a potentially extensive project

- Consideration was given to the fact that the conditions placed on the sale by SHDC might have changed

- Concern that interest from UPC would compete with any community groups wishing to bid

- Concern that any joint initiative could ultimately leave the Council liable

- The attendance at the public meeting had not demonstrated overwhelming support by the community for the purchase of the toilets and further consultation would need to be done

- Two people who attended the meeting had not wanted the toilets in Bittaford reopened at all

- Congratulations for progress made to date by G-Up to form a CIC

- The clerk advised that the potential cost of the project to make the building(s) fit for purpose and then maintain as public toilets would be a severe financial risk for the council

We finally agreed to vote on the matter and agreed: (5 for, 4 against and 1 abstention) that we would express an interest in order to trigger the 6-month moratorium period. (This is a 6-month period when the buildings cannot be sold other than to a community group who has expressed an interest in purchase) This will give a community group more time to prepare and be in a position to take their idea forward. We are not committing to taking on the facilities.

**School Field** We are pleased to say that we are now close to finalising legal and insurance matters for this and, although there are still a few things to iron out, we hope this project will finally come to fruition before the summer holidays.





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### Rainfall at Shellwood Hill George Arnison

Apparently, it was the warmest UK May on record (1884), but it also continued to be wetter than average so I'm not sure it felt like it.
